London, Feb. 1.—The correspondent of the Times at Lorenzo Marquez, telegraphing yesterday, says.—Information has been received from Pretoria that the war department, considering that it will be useless to storm Ladysmith, and the bombardment has proved ineffective, has decided on a change of tactics. Huge quantities of timber and sand bags, and hundreds of Kaffirs have been sent from Johannesburg and Pretoria for the purpose of daming Klip River, some miles below Ladysmith, the idea being to flood the town and to drive ing to flood the town and to drive the soldiers and inhabitants out of the bomb-proof caves, so as to ex-

Buller will make another attempt to relieve the besieged place. If the Daily Mail's report of Gen. Buller's statement, that he hoped to be in Ladysmith within a week, could be implicitly relied on, news of further serious fighting would be expected shortly. Prominent Astronomer says Leonid Meteors will fall in 1900.

Theory of Dr B. J See Concerning the ong looked for Astronomical Visions.

The brilliant spectacle of the Leonid meteors has been announced one year too soon," says Dr. B. J. See, one of the most advanced astronomers in the United States ser Dr. See has charge of the 26inch equatorial telescope at the naval observatory at Washington. He intimated that he was able to reach a conclusion concerning the Leonids. pased upon careful astronomical calculations' that would not harmonize views heretofore held by astronomers. He stated with great positiveness that the meteoric display, which has been a mere sputter this year, would be repeated in November next ear, with a brilliancy quite i' not superior, to any of the tricentury displays with which the

dern word has been startled. "Astronomical calculations not erred as to the periodicity of the said Dr. Se . "But the generally accepted conclusion as to the time it takes the Leonids to pass the earth's orbit has After the most careful obwrong. servations, made with the best in-struments in the service of the Government, and after the most uner-ring calculations in a strict conformto astronomical laws, I am thoroughly convinced that the period

of passage is two years instead of one year, as heretofore believed.

"The Leenids have been within the earth's orbit for a year now, and will remain with us for another 12 months. The meteoric shower has not been as heavy this time as there was good scientific reason for be-lieving it would be. That is because we have not yet struck the thick

part of the trail. By my calculations; this collision will occur in the middle of November, 1900. Then the resultant display of burning meteors will be as brilliant as the one observed by Humboldt in Venezuela in 1799. "The present visitation is a counterpart of that in/1863. At that time there were displays in two years. That of 1832 was about as feeble as the present has been and that of the succeeding year nearly as striking as that recorded by Humboldt."
