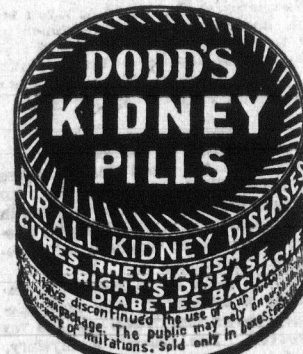

"OLD LONDON"

On Monday evening Rev. J. W. Hoyt, pastor of the William St. Baptist church, addressed the Park St. Epworth League, on his recent visit to Old London. Mr. Hoyt is a very eloquent speaker, and on Monday evening his lecture was very entertaining as well as instructive. He spoke of the great amount of business which is daily transacted in this the world's greatest metropolis and pictured the immense amount of traffic of pedestrians, horses and vehicles mingled together in some of the narrow streets. He took his hearers through the great London Museum and dwelt at length on his visit to the Tower, where so many of England's royalty had been executed and where the original knife, block and thumb screws still stand to the view of the curious of ancient historical deeds. The main part of the lecture was based on the speaker's visit to the slums. Here he saw with his own eyes the drinking and eating in the hotels together with the men, and pretty arranged birch-roads dealt out the liquor at the bar. Mr. Hoyt took occasion to loudly congratulate our government on the stand they have taken in introducing a bill whereby the services of lady-bartenders are prohibited in our Dominion.

During the evening the Misses Groves rendered a very nice duet entitled "Loving this way." and Miss Tenon Harper also sang a very expressive solo. The scripture lesson was read by Miss Ethel Sandison, and the meeting was presided over by J. Mackness, 2nd Vice Pres. of the League.

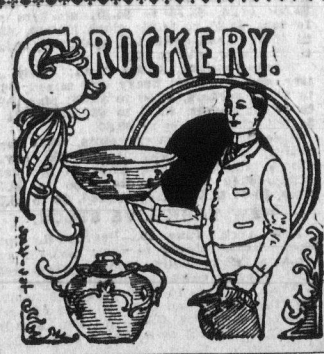
