Threaten Premier Pascis.

Premier Pascis has received a number of threatening letters intimating that the present dynasty will meet a fate similar to that of its predecessor. The late King Alexander was a member of the Obrenovitz family. It is asserted that secret meetings of the auti-dynastic leaders have been held here to select a European prince as a successor to King Peter in the event of a successful anti-dynastic movement.

STABBED AND KILLED.

Fatal Affray Near Parry Sound—Commenced By Drunken Italians.
Parry Sound, Dec. 27.—A message from Grant's Camp, on the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway construction works, reached here yesterday with news of a murder and serious stabbing affray Tuesday night. A party of Italians, under the influence of liquor, started from the camp and went to the farmhouse of Mr. McCormick, where they attempted to assault Mrs. McCormick.
Word had been sent to the camp and a party of Swedes, headed by Mr. McDodd, a nephew of Grant, the contractor, started out. On their arrival at McCormick's a fight took place, in which McDodd was fatally stabbed and died shortly afterwards. Three of the Swedes were also stabbed, one probably fatally.

The Italians got away, and pursuit is being made. McCormick's farm is about six miles from Whitestone, and 30 miles from here. Crown Attorney Haight, being notified, has started constables in pursuit.

Madame Gould's Liabilities.

Paris, Dec. 27.—The three suits brought by creditors with the object of making Madame Gould, who was of making Madame Gould, who was Countess Boni de Castellane, jointly responsible with the count for certain claims, were decided yesterday. The court found that she was in no way responsible for the claims of M. Zeigler, one of the largest creditors, who claimed that it had been the practice of the Castellanes, ever since their marriage, to appeal to him to exericate them from financial difficulties, but held her jointly liable for jewels valued at \$24,000, purchased from Mile. Vera Nimidoff of Odessa, who sold the jewels to Count Lond through the intermediary of jewelers. The court also found that Madame Gould was jointly liable for about \$57,000, the balance due to the Hartogs for a jewelry bill, amounting to about \$137,000, provided the bill was not padded. Three experts were appointed to appraise the value of the jew-

Found Dead In Hotel. Ingersoll, Dec. 27.—Lying on his back, with his hands clasped on his breast, Frank Siples was found dead at 7 o'clock yesterday morning, in a bedroom at the Kirwin House. A gas jet half turned on told the story. The supposition is that Siples only partly turned the gas off. His friends will not entertain the suicide theory.

Grounds on Midway Island. Midway Island, Pacific Ocean, Dec. 27.—The barque Carrolton of San Francisco, from Newcastle, N.S.W., Oct. 7, for Honolulu, struck the south reef off Midway Island early yesterday morning. All the crew were saved. There is no hope of saving the vessel.

Capt. Newcombe Vindicated. Ottawa, Dec. 27.—Captain Newcombe of the Government steamer
Keshel, employed on the Pacific
Coast, who was suspended on account
of alleged irregularities in connection
with the purchase of supplies, has
been reinstated. An investigation was
held, and his conduct vindicated.

Washington, Dec. 27.—Sir Mortimer Durand, the retiring British Ambassador, and Lady Durand, will sail for England Dec. 29. Eame Howard, counsellor for the Embassy, will act as charge d'affaires until the arrival of James Bryce, the new Ambassador.

Peter 1 Of Servia May Meet
Fate Of Late King Alexander

WANT TO DETHRONE KING

Belgrade, Servia, Dec. 27.—The National Assembly has finally accepted the loan and armament bills which were sent yesterday for signature to King Pater.

Calcutta, Dec. 27.—At the opening of the Indian National Congress yesterday, Dadabhl Naorojid, formerly a member of the British Parliament, delivered an address, insisting upon the rights of Indians, as British subjects, to govern themselves.

The speaker pointed out that the Boers, who, the Indians helped to subjugate, had been given self-government, while India was still without it, and urged that a large patriotic fund be raised to educate Indians as to their rights and to carry on the campaign in England.

There were upwards of 10,000 delegates present and the speech was received with a tumult of applause.


