Even now the worn-out and largely mountainous countries of Europe produce more food to an acre in proportion to their dense populations than the United States does in proportion to its sparse ones. There is indeed in the latter country less corn produced in proportion to the fast-increasing population by thirteen percent than ten years ago. When the virgin soil of the west was producing corn to burn there was not much encouragement to intensive cultivation in any part of the country; but the time seems to have come for the real farmer—the man who, instead of simply plundering the soil of its productive power, knows how to nourish and cherish it into abundant fruitfulness. When food ceases to be an export the country will no longer be able to rest all its burdens down upon an unprotected food producer, but will have to pay him what it owes him for his labor. So the farmer's day is coming.

The Ancient Bow.

Although universally used by the ancients, the form of the bow varied with different nations. The Scythian bow was in the form of the letter C, and the bow of the Tartars, descendants of the Scythians, still keeps that shape. The Greek bow was not more than four feet in length, but so stout and stiff that it required considerable strength and skill to use it. It is said that the first Greek bows were made from the horns of a species of goat, the bases being united by means of a metallic band. Afterward other material was used in their manufacture, but they still retained their original shape. These bows were too short to be of much use, and only a small portion of the troops were armed with them.

The Romans brought the bow to Britain, where it at once obtained favor and during the middle ages was extensively used, forming an important weapon of the armies of that period. The English archers were said to be the finest in the world, and their skill decided the battles of Crecy, Poitiers and Agincourt. The bows were of two kinds—the longbow and the arbalest, or crossbow. The arbalest was made of steel or horn and was of such strength and stiffness that it was necessary to use some mechanical appliance to bend it and to adjust the string. The arbalesters carried quivers with fifty arrows and were placed in the van of the battle.

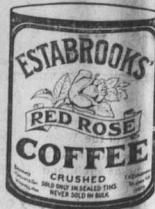

The License department of the Ontario government is investigating the sales of certain patent medicines, which, it is charged, are nullifying the liquor laws of the Province in some places. The specific case upon which the department is engaged mentions the much advertised Perna as a favorite substitute for straight whiskey.
