Total number of prisoners, 138.

The Secretary took the chair and called the meeting to order, and stated that Mr. Newton had been appointed by the County Council, and Mr. W. S. Knowles, appointed by the Town Council, to represent the Board of Public Instruction.

It was the narrowest escape that we have witnessed, and sent a thrill of horror through all who beheld it.
