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INCORPORATION

The meeting of ratepayers on Monday evening for discussing the matter of incorporation was fairly well attended. E. C. Morgan occupied the chair and F. R. Kelly recorded the proceedings. Members of a committee appointed at the time of the last agitation to secure signatures to petitions for a charter gave a report of the work they had done. They had met practically no opposition. Those who spoke in favor of incorporation were W. D. Keith, J. T. G. Carr, J. E. McCallum, Dr. MacIntosh, R. W. Cameron, M. L. Hayward, Frank Hagerman, F. H. Stevens and others. None were outspoken against it, but there were those, especially those in the outskirts of the village who wanted more light. Very much of the spirit of opposition, manifested by an undercurrent of feeling rather than outspoken expression of thought, was satisfied when it was explained that provision would be made so that those not receiving the benefit of water service, fire protection, etc., would be exempted from taxation for these things. It was shown that a considerable less taxation for roads would be required unless more was expended on them than at present. On the whole it was apparent in this discussion that taxes need not necessarily be any higher for anyone while those not receiving all the public services of the town might have even a less tax than at present.

The meeting was postponed until next Monday evening at eight sharp when it is expected the opposition forces will be better organized. In almost every instance those who show hostility to the movement seem to have a personal interest in opposing it. Much has and still may be said in favor of incorporation but so far little sound argument has been put up against it. No ratepayer should be absent from the meeting next Monday evening.

conscious that the farmers should have a very important part in the governing of the country, and the new Society, a success elsewhere, is entitled to encouragement and toleration by all classes. The organization is still in a formative state, however, and a portion of its articles of faith includes freedom from party politics. This is most commendable and should be adhered to. But all the farmers comprising the society are either Liberals or Conservatives, and very pronounced in their views at that. At present their tie to party is a great deal stronger than their tie to the society and the chances are that many of them would not vote for their candidate if they put up one. Not to do so would wreck their organization. Later, when their society is thoroughly seasoned and its members more strongly drawn together, they should be able to not only put a strong candidate in the field, but to elect him.

The Observer commends the idea of the election of a member of U.F. of N.B. by acclamation, but the answer of B. F. Smith and W. S. Sutton, is such as to make this impossible.

The day is at hand when the farmers should have, and the time is not far off when they will have a more commanding representation in the Legislature. They are entitled to it. But at the present stage the farmers are not yet sufficiently weaned from old party ties to form a party of their own—although, as stated, that day is soon to dawn.

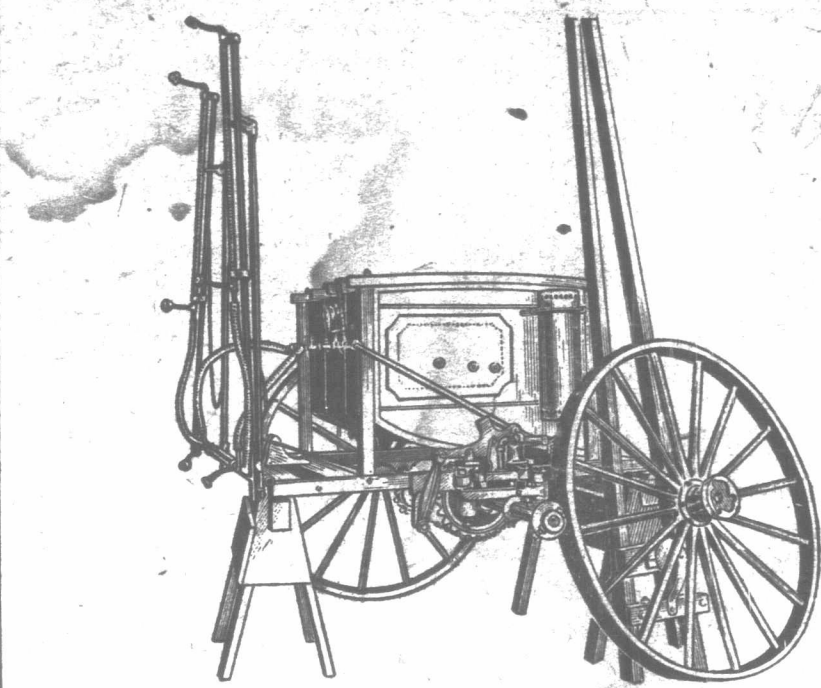

The pump proper rests on the axle, doing away with the strain on the frame of the sprayer. The pump is so located that it enables us to build this machine in perfect balance.

The tank or barrel is also located over the axle.

The pump and air chamber are made of heavy iron castings which reduce the breakage to a minimum. This sprayer all the way through, is built of nothing but the best materials.

The frame is of two-inch ash reinforced with angle iron, which insures perfect

alignment; the axle is made of one and three-quarters inch cold rolled steel shafting.

A strong axle is an important feature in a horse-drawn sprayer. The axle of a poorly constructed machine usually breaks when the grower is in the midst of spraying and oftentimes causes expensive and troublesome delays, since when the axle breaks it also allows the weight of the machine to break the axle boxes.

We assure you that there is no danger of the axle on the No. 39 AUTO-SPRAY becoming broken.

The valves and plungers of this pump are of brass and all of the working parts of the pump are easily accessible. The wheels are of hickory and of Sarven pattern. They last indefinitely.

To operate this sprayer after it has been set up it is only necessary to fill the tank and drive fifty or one hundred feet until a satisfactory pressure is produced and then drive over the field.

On flow valve, relief valve, pressure gauge, shut-off are all before the driver's seat.

The NON-CLOG Junior nozzle furnishes 1 with this sprayer saves the operator many hours of time that is usually spent in cleaning the nozzles. In an actual test these nozzles were used for spraying a solution containing sawdust and did not clog.
