## THEO. GALLEY DROWNED.

Sad Accident Last Week on Board the Alexandra on A. O. H. Excursion.

NO RESCUE AT TEMPTED.

Conflicting Stories that Should Receive an Investigation.

A sad fatality occurred on Tuesday 30th, during the excursion on the steamer Alexandra, under the auspices of the Chatham Division of the A. O. H. Theophilus Galley of Newcastle, a young man 20 years of age, fell overboard from the upper deck, and was drowned.

There have been many conflicting versions of the occurrence current since it happened, but from careful enquiries we can give the following as correct.

Galley went to Chatham Tuesday morning. In the evening he got on the excursion boat about 8 o'clock. He was accompanied by two companions, and between them they drank a bottle of gin. They were sober coming on board, or at any rate able to look after themselves. A young woman named Carrie Savery was on the excursion boat, accompanied by Galley's brother Frank. They had gone down, knowing he was at Chatham, in order to meet him and see that he came home. Galley had been "keeping company" with Miss Savery for some time.

When he came on the boat, he met her and the three stayed together most of the time. After a while, when they were down in the cabin, Galley told Miss Savery that he felt sick, and was going to get a breath of cool air. He also said he would like a cold bath, or something to that effect which she did not catch. He was seasick from the motion of the boat, and the effect of the liquor probably made it worse. He went up on the upper deck and went to the stern. Miss Savery went after him, and stopped for a moment to speak to Frank Galley. Just as she turned to walk on, she saw Theophilus Galley, who was leaning over the rail as if to vomit, lose his balance and fall overboard. The boat was then running down river a short distance below Chatham.

Miss Savery says she wanted to jump over to help him, because she could swim and she knew he could not. Anyway there was some confusion and the crowd gathered around. Frank Galley forced his way through the crowd, and running to the wheelhouse told the captain his brother was overboard and drowning, and to stop the boat. He says the captain replied it was then too late and too dark to make a search. Frank Galley

and Miss Savery also say that others told the captain, but nothing was done. Captain Nowlan said the first man to bring the report to him was a young man named Connors, who said a man told him, and that he (the captain) told Connors to go back and get his informant and bring him up. This was about opposite Stewart's Landing, about 2 1/2 miles below Chatham. The captain admits that others also told him about the same time that there was a man overboard, but he thought it was too late to do any good by turning back, and also feared that if he did so, in the confusion and crowding among the passengers, others might fall over. He admitted that he did not know how much time had elapsed between the accident and the first report of it to him. The boat continued on her course, and nothing was done.

The body is being grappled for, but has not yet been recovered. The deceased young man was well spoken of by all who knew him. He is reported to have been of steady habits, and those he had worked for thought highly of him. He was the eldest son of Mrs. John Fagan, by her first husband, Wm. Galley, and lived with her at "The Rocks" in this town.
