

MAYOR BIGGAR AND ALDERMEN

Are Still Able to Breathe the Air of Freedom.

Conspiracy Case Against Them Was Adjudged for a Week.

A. J. Douglas Acquitted on Two More Charges To-day.

The charge of combining and conspiring preferred against Mayor S. D. Biggar, eighteen members of this year's City Council and three ex-aldermen, was adjudged for a week at the police court this morning, at the request of Crown Attorney Washington, on account of the illness of City Solicitor MacKellan. Mr. Washington intimated that he would probably be obliged to ask for another adjournment at the end of that time as the assizes would be on then.

After being acquitted of two charges of theft preferred against him by his former partner, A. L. Burke, Alexander J. Douglas was served with a writ at the police court this morning in a civil action for \$700. A few months ago Douglas was arrested in connection with a robbery at the firm's office, on King street east, when books and papers were mutilated and some of them stolen. He was acquitted by the Magistrate.

The first charge was stealing \$16 from Mrs. Mary C. Berg, of Chicago, who sent a money order last August in payment for rent. Burke wrote to her complaining about not receiving the money and then an investigation was begun. The mutilated cash books were produced but the pages which should show the transaction were missing. R. J. Miller, a post-office employee swore he paid the money on August 26th. When the crown asked for an adjournment to get the original from Ottawa, George S. Kerr objected.

Douglas admitted signing the letter and cashing the order, but declared Burke knew about it and that the money was handed over to him.

"That story does not look reasonable to me," commented Mr. Washington.

"Possibly it is true," suggested His Worship. "There is that possibility in everything," retorted the defendant. "There is no circumstance that would make me believe one of them more than the other," said the Magistrate as he dismissed the case.

Douglas was then arraigned on a charge of stealing \$11 from a former Hamilton woman now residing in New York. She swore she paid the sum to Douglas the day before his arrest, in his office. He swore positively he had no recollection of the transaction and that he had never misappropriated a cent of the firm's money. This charge was also dismissed. Before Douglas left the court he was served with the writ. Burke paid the expenses of the two witnesses from the State.

But what asked for a week's remand for Dave Vin, who was arrested by Detectives Campbell and Miller, yesterday, accused of stealing a brass tap and lead pipe. They expect to find the owner by then.

James Patter, who is alleged to have helped James Daney steal a number of guns and rifles from Kartzmarz's store on King William street, was remanded for a week.

The police will make another attempt to have William Brady, cabman, respond to an invitation to explain why he left his horses untied. P. C. May is the complainant.

New York Jan. 2.—London stocks are irregular, but are not expected to be a factor in this market, which promises to continue steady, with a further moderate extension of the reaction probable.

The strength in money yesterday was a decided disappointment to those who had been basing on the expectation that a relaxation of rates would come immediately after the end of the year, and it is likely that more attention will be paid to the course of money than to anything else to-day.

Underlying sentiment continues bullish, but one thing or the other must happen—either money must relax materially in a very short time, or liquidation in stocks must be resorted to, in order to relieve the situation.

Cabled advices indicate that the monetary situation in London and the continent will improve materially within the next few days, in which event foreign money will be available here, but the continued holding of stocks at present must be reckoned with. It looks as though the monetary strain will continue for a longer time than has been commonly expected, and buyers of stocks at present must pay heavy carrying charges.

The trading element seems inclined to work for a further reaction, and the technical condition would be more favorable thereby. We should not be inclined to buy, except on a good reaction.
