SANDSUCKER IS A WRECK.

Was Burned Almost to Water's Edge This Morning.

Fire Supposed to be Caused By Overheated Boiler.

An Insurance of \$3,000 Will Likely Cover Loss.

The city's famous \$12,000 sandsucker which seems to find it almost as hard to keep out of trouble as a duck does to keep out of water, met with another dire mishap this morning. It came within an ace of being burned to the water's edge, and was so badly damaged that the work of cleaning out the northern filtering basin and scooping out the middle road may be delayed several weeks. The fire broke out at 6.20 this morning, supposedly from an overheated boiler, got big start before being discovered and swept the upper deck of the sucker from stem to stern. Officials of the department said this morning they would be

ment said this morning they would be unable to state how long the sucker would be out of commission until an expert went over the machinery.

To guard against any trouble, those in charge of the operations had arranged to have a watchman on guard during the night. Captain Bongard, who was placed in command after Captain Hemphill lett, and his brother, were watching the dredge last night. Early this morning the captain went on shore and left his brother sleeping on the dredge. A reflection in the sky while he was walking away attracted his attention, and, looking around, he found snioke and flames pouring out of the batchway. He hurried back to the dredge and tried to get the hose used for fire purposes. The fire was so hot in the boiler room, however, that he could not get in to turn on the steam and start the pump working. Bongard's brother had to make a hurried exit in his night clothes, and one ried exit in his night clothes and one side of his face was scorched by the flames. Chief TenEyck was notified by

side of his face was scorched by the flames. Chief TenEyck was notified by the employees at the pump house and hustled down in his buggy, with four men. A bucket brigade was formed and the fire was extinguished, but not before it had burned the frame work away almost to the water's edge.

The men's sleeping quarters on the dredge, with the captain's clothes, were totally destroyed. Chief TenEyck gave it as his opinion that an overheated boiler caused the fire. Captain Bongard says he made a trip around the sucker half an hour before the fire was discovered and found everything all right.

Chairman Clark, of the Fire and Water Committee, was down at the Beach this morning, with Secretary James, to see what damage had been done. They decided that the proper caper would be to get an expert machinist to go over the machinery. Cutil that was ascertained they could not say when operations would be begun again. Chairman Clark does not think the machinery is injured. There is only \$3,000 insurance on the dredge, but he thinks this will cover the damage. It was thought that this was a sufficient amount of insurance to carry, as it was all the Toronto people held on it befrore disposing of the dredge. The sucker had completed the job of cleaning out the south basin and was engaged yesterday scooping out the middle road, which has been the subject was engaged yesterday scooping out the middle road, which has been the subject

middle road, which has been the subject of a squabble between Mayor Stewart and the Beach Commissioners.

There seems to be a "hoodoo' attached to the poor old sucker. After the city purchased it the trouble began. Some of the aldermen got uneasy when it was not brought up from Toronto as soon as they desired. It spent nearly two months doing private work before the job at the filtering basins was begun. In relaying the intake off the lake shore the machinery was broken. When it finally got into the basins stories about the captain and crew reached the Fire and Water Committee, and at one fell swoop it choped their heads off. Another bill of expense for re-pairs and the sucker got down to busi-ness again. Everything went lovely, one basin was cleaned out and the sucker was making a wreck of the middle road when last night's disaster interfered. What next?

the question is being asked if the city got a "lemon" in the dredge. It is said that last night's fire revealed the fact that the wood was so rotten it was possible to kick a hole in it with the toe of one's boot.
