Again the question is being asked if the city got a "phooed" in the dredge. It is said that last night's fire revealed the fact that the wood was so rotted that it was possible to kick a hole in it with the toe of one's boot.

THE SOO LOAN.

Report That Guarantee Covering Part of it Has Been Renewed.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—For nearly a week negotiations have been in progress at the parliament buildings concerning the renewal of the \$1,000,000 loan from the province to the Soo Consolidated Co.

It was reported yesterday that the government has been relieved of \$250,000 of the remaining \$1,000,000, and that the guarantee covering the rest has been renewed for a short period.

The government announcement regarding the Soo loan guarantee was not to be made until to-day, as papers must be signed at Montreal and New York.
