P. R. steamer officials are optimistic, yet in outside circles a profound gloom is to be seen. The Mount Royal has been out of Antwerp since Dec. 6, or 29 days, and is twelve or 14 days overdue.

THE CHILD. Mrs. Hughes' Splendid Talk at Y. W. C. A. Yesterday. The second talk of the series, by Mrs. Hughes, on "Letters to a Mother," was given in the Y. W. C. A. building yesterday afternoon and was very well attended. Mrs. Hughes took as the basis of her remarks a typical game played in every nursery, the fundamental principle of which, however, is of the widest application. The child is a self-making being, this is the Divine purpose. Instinct urges him to action—make the action definite by a sympathetic response to it. Arousing resistance justifies in him the love of exertion and awakens a sense of power. Seek to employ energies rather than to amuse by doing for him, for fostering idleness, exactingness, and the habit of passive amusement. Passive amusements create a keener appetite with no satisfaction. Activities accent their own charm. How may energy be incited, guided, restrained and developed? The kindergarten is a concrete illustration of one phase of the question. Energies are directed into definite channels, leading to production that is self-making. Let the nurture of sympathy go hand in hand with the incitement of activity and from the union of these will spring humility and helpfulness. Sympathy without activity leads to inordinance; craving for appreciation. Activity without sympathy gives rise to a list of power. Attention flows out to all who procure it; the child that elation of spirit which comes from successful achievement.

THE CHILD. Mrs. Hughes' Splendid Talk at Y. W. C. A. Yesterday. The value of \$25,000,000 placed on the annual output of honey puts this farm crop which only slightly behind raw cane sugar, which had a valuation at the refinery of \$28,000,000. Comparisons with the output of the sixty-four beet-sugar factories, which have a capacity of 49,500 tons of beets daily, may seem odd. Yet the product of this coddled and fostered industry is—\$45,000,000—was less than double that of the honey bee communities. The bee in effect pays the interest on the public debt—\$24,710,000. Still not the insect which Napoleon made an imperial emblem had some state recognition such as Massachusetts gives to the edifice in its legislative halls. As a matter of fact, the products of the New England fisheries, which have been the subject of treaties and international conventions and occasionally raised the spectre of war, amount in value to only half the bee's product.—The New York World.
