SHIP NEWS.—
Schooner *Clydesdale* from Boston arrived at
Charlottetown on the 27th instant. The *Clydesdale*
left the island about a month since.

On the night of the 17th December, being a gale
from South East, there came on shore near Country
Harbour, pieces of a wrecked vessel, supposed to
have struck on the Pollen, a dry ledge, lying within three miles of the land. The unfortunate crew is
supposed to have perished, as no bodies have been
found; all that was saved from the wreck was a
mainmast and foremast, standing and running rigging,
cut and torn to pieces, by the sea and rocks. Two
heads came ashore with the name "Brothers." P.
H. Island, reported on board; a part of a mizenmast
broken, and the lower part of the bowsprit separated
from the Captain. It appears that she was only in ballast,
having no cargo on board. I made diligent
search and found nothing more than what is mentioned
above, which I left in care of the man who saved
her for the benefit of the underwriters."

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.

with upwards of £1,000,000 of money, had arrived in England.

ITALY.—Francesca Madiai whose case has

rence. A correspondent of the London
Times says he believes he was poisoned.

The Lieutenant Governor will thank the Colonial
Secretary to intimate to Mr. Higgins, J. P., Queen's
County, that the Committee of the Executive Council
appear to have investigated the complaint brought
