Calgary Albertan: "The shipment of cattle this year will be greater than any previous year, as far as Western Canada is concerned," said Mr. McMullen, live stock commissioner of the C. P. R.

"The shipments from Swift Current o the mountains will be 12,000 more

han on any previous year. "The shipment of export cattle will otal 65,000 head. This does not in clude the butcher cattle shipped out of the province, which amounts to about 20,000 to 25,000 cattle.

"The prices during the year, though not high, have been steady, and the trade has been fairly remunerative.' When asked for the reason of the arge shipment, Mr. McMullen said that it was due to the fact that three years ago, a large number of dogies be such a large shipment next year

Mr. McMullen's experience was that he large ranchers were not going out of the ranching business, though some of them were being forced back on account of the pasture difficulty In some few cases there was a curtailment, but in other places an increase.
