A MANIA FOR GAMBLING.

IMMIGRATION IS HELD IN CHECK

Inrush Restricted by Department to Obviate Congestion of the Labor Market.

"During the past year the policy of the Dominion government in immigration department has been to curtail the incoming immigration in accordance with the surplus of labor."

"For the nine months from January 1st to September 30th, 1907, there came to the Dominion 235,440 immigrants, while for the corresponding period in the present year the total was 127,564, a falling off of 46 per cent."

"The greatest falling off was from the ocean ports of the continent and the British Isles, but as the result of the restrictions there has been a most pleasing effect on the quality of the immigration which has never been of a better standard than at present."

"The outstanding feature of this year has been the almost total absence of persons of this kind brought about by the methods of checking at the ocean ports on this side and the border line."

"During the second period just referred to there have been over 1,600 persons deported from Canada, while there were rejected an equal number either at the ocean ports or at the border line."

"The stringent measures have had a good effect upon the booking agents upon the other side inasmuch as they have learned that unless they make a success of their booking, they will be rejected when they reach this side."

"The decrease of immigration in the present fiscal year, April to October, inclusive, was 434, comprising 255 men, 123 women and 55 children. For the corresponding period of last year the Japanese immigration was 6,234. The decrease this year is, therefore 6,234."

Governor Cummings Iowa Senator.

Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 24.—Governor A. B. Cummings was elected as United States Senator today to fill the unexpired term of William B. Allison. He received 106 votes and defeated the Democratic candidate, 55, in the legislature. His re-election for a six-year term next January is unquestioned.
