EDMONTON RETAINS LEAD OF THE LEAGUE

The Mighty Moose Broke Up the Game in the Third Inning by Hitting Out Home Run With Two Men on—Dell Pitched Stellar Ball, Allowing Only Four Hits.

(Saturday's Daily.)

Edmonton retained its position at the head of the league by defeating Saskatoon in the first game of the home series last night by a score of six to one. Dell was in the box for Edmonton and pitched sterling ball, holding the Berry Pickers down to four hits. Gordon was the opposing twirler. For the first five innings he proved somewhat of a puzzle to the Deacons' stick artists, but in the sixth inning his delivery was solved to the extent of two successive singles and a home run which netted three tallies.

It was Moose Baxter who swung the stick for a clean circuit of the bases in the sixth and changed the complexion of the game which up to this point had been somewhat dubious. In the seventh inning the visitors were put to rout by a repetition of the scorching ball of the preceding innings.

The fielding of Lussi in centre garden was the feature of the game. He made five difficult put outs, several of them of a spectacular nature. He also distinguished himself with the stick by driving out a three-bagger in the fourth inning.

Saskatoon scored first in the third inning. Schaeffer drove a base and went to second on Gordon's out at first. While man singled to left field scoring Schaeffer.

In the fourth innings Lussi tore off a three-bagger after Baxter had gone out at first and Morse had been robbed of a hit by Harper's clever fielding. Cox failed to connect safely. Lussi made two sensational catches in centre in the fifth disposing of Miller and Gordon.

The Deacons' only break loss in the sixth innings. Dell opened the innings with a single to right. White went in to run for him. Mills singled and stole second. While went to third on an error by Harper. Then Baxter drove the sphere into the tall grass by the right field for a home run, scoring White and Mills.

Saskatoon got men on second and third in the seventh innings with two down, but the best Schaeffer could do was fly out to Waters.

LACOMBE ROUTE HAS NO GREAT OBSTACLES

Senator Talbot Claims That Brazeau Branch Could Be Built With Little Difficulty—Harvesting In Full Swing in Lacombe District and Crops Are Good.

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—Senator Talbot, of Lacombe, who spent yesterday in the city, stated that he had not yet given up hope of inducing the C.N.R. to run its Stettler to Brazeau line through Lacombe.

The plea set up by the railway company before the deputy minister of railways, when asking for approval of its route plan to cross the C. & E. railway between Blackfalds and Red Deer, that there were engineering difficulties in the country west of Lacombe is, he said, without foundation.

The country out in the Bentley and Rimbey districts is one of the finest sections of Alberta and the railway companies are very anxious to build it. The farmers are forced to haul their grain for 35 miles and 40 miles to market and have been for years awaiting the construction of a railway through their district.

In one township alone over thirty miles west of Lacombe there are ten thousand acres of splendid grain this year. In Senator Talbot's opinion it is too bad that these prosperous communities should be left any longer without railway facilities in order to make it possibly a little easier for a railway company to construct a line parallel to and close to another line, and which will open up a new country.

Harvesting operations, Senator Talbot said, are in full swing in the Lacombe district and if the frost keeps off for another ten days, the great bulk of the grain will be cut and be past all danger of injury from that source.

HARVEST IN PROGRESS.

Fifty Per Cent. of Grain Down in North Battleford by End of Week.

North Battleford, Aug. 16.—The binders are all busy and harvesting is in full swing. About fifty per cent. of the crops will be down by next Saturday if weather conditions remain favorable. The majority of farmers say their crops are better than anticipated. The gophers had made bad havoc round some of the fields, and this had given rise to the impression that the crops were in some cases poor. Now when the crops are being cut many fields that were reported poor are looking up fine, and the average will be higher than anticipated.

A large collection of grains and vegetables are being collected by the board of trade for shipment to the Toronto exhibition. After the exhibition it will be shipped to a number of the full fair, and the exhibit is one of the finest ever sent from this district.

The North Battleford citizens are feeling elated over the results of the high school pupils at the recent examinations. Out of forty-two students only two names are missing from the successful list. This is a record for our high school work and Principal Huff, together with his associate teachers, are receiving congratulations for their highly successful achievement.

AIRSHIP BEAT PIGEON.

Fifty Mile Race Against Birds Won by Six Minutes.

Amiens, France, Aug. 18.—The first race between the birds of nature and of man took place today in the great country race, and easily won by man. Forty-seven carrier pigeons were released at Douai today at the same instant that Leblanc and his Farman bi-plane started from the mark, on his fifty-mile flight to Amiens. Rushing without a tremor through the calm air, the bi-plane soon outdistanced the birds, and when Leblanc reached Amiens, the flock was not yet in sight; the first pigeon arrived six minutes and twenty seconds after Leblanc. Before the last of the flock had come in Leblanc, who had started at the same time as Leblanc, had consumed nine minutes more on the trip, arriving, beating the last pigeon by 12 minutes.

HARVESTER STRUCK BY TRAIN.

Was Walking on the Ties When C. N. R. Came Around Curve. Portage la Prairie, Man., Aug. 18.—Ernest Rickards, of Winnipeg, started down the ties with Robt. Piddler, of this place, to walk to a farm yesterday morning where they were hired for the harvest. Rickards started down to rest on the track and Piddler in the ditch in a curve near the Assiniboine river bridge, when a C. N. R. train came round the curve and struck Rickards out off the track, fracturing both legs and inflicting internal injuries. Rickards was sent to St. Boniface hospital, where he was still unconscious early this morning.

POST OFFICE TEST CASE.

Political Circulars Mailed With One Cent Stamp.

Victoria, B.C., Aug. 17.—Judgment was rendered this afternoon by Police Magistrate Prior in the case of the Post Office Department against Baxter and Johnson. The defendants were charged with an infraction of the regulations by sending by express a great quantity of political circular letters, which were posted at various cities and towns with a one-cent stamp. Baxter and Johnson stood before the court on each side of the case, which is exciting a great deal of interest here, owing to the political nature of it, it is said, he appealed.

CONSTABLE TO BLAME.

Coroner's Jury Censure Man Who Had Suicide in Charge.

Winnipeg, Aug. 18.—The jury empaneled under Coroner Inglis last night to investigate the death of James Knight, a farmer of Rosewood, arrested for attempted murder of his wife and who purchased poison and committed suicide while in custody, recommended that the Pharmacists be made planner and greater restrictions be placed on the sale of poisons and delivered to the addresses by the chief of provincial police should see that his men are properly instructed.

FRENCH CAPITAL IS COMING TO CANADA

Consul Francis, of Victoria, Says That Western Part of the Dominion is Especially Attractive to French Investors.

Winnipeg, Aug. 18.—That French money is just as ready for investment in Western Canada as the millions of English capitalists who are at the present time, invested \$1,500,000 in Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, is the statement of A. O. P. Francis, consul for France at Victoria, B.C.

Mr. Francis was instrumental in the organization of a strong syndicate of French capitalists which has, to the present time, invested \$1,500,000 in Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. He states that their investments are turning out exceedingly well, and that if the returns for the present year are as great as in the past—and there is every indication that they will be—there will be practically unlimited French capital for investment in Canada next year.

Mr. Francis was at the Royal Alexandra hotel while a number of noted English capitalists were also there, and stated in no uncertain way that they are but the forerunners of dozens of European money lords who are looking to Canada as the best field for investment offered in the world today. He predicts that the flow of capital from the money centers of the Old World will be greater in the next few years than ever in the past.

Mr. Francis is in close touch with the reality movement from Winnipeg to the coast and believes that the outlook at the present time is better than at any time since he first became interested several years ago.


