Not long ago I wrote of a wife who went away for her vacation alone, leaving her husband at home to look after their three children. You will remember that it was his suggestion, made because he realized how tired and worn she was. Now she is back. Not only rested and reinvigorated, but with a fresh viewpoint. She declares that she had become "stale" both as a wife and a mother, although she never realized it before she got away by herself.

Little Things Bothered Her. Little things her children did bothered her beyond all reason. This was not because she was a poor mother, but because she was such a good one. She was with her children or thinking about them continually. She was literally too close to her subject. She needed to get away to get fresh perspective.

Of course she returned to them hungry for them. She had not been gone a day before she wanted to come home to them. But she did not give in, although they were never far from her mind. She thought of little tricks the children had, some cunning, and others not so cunning. She missed even the latter, thinking of them lovingly and sympathetically, much more so than usual.

In other words, she has had opportunity to stand aside and, while renewing her own reservoirs of vitality, get a fresh, unhampered view of her children and her relations with them. Even more than all this is the sympathy and understanding that her husband now has for her problems. For two weeks he had all the care of the children. Crops Practically Safe.

Winnipeg, August 21.—Mr. Vere Brown, superintendent of the central western branches of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, returned to Winnipeg last night from a western trip, during which he visited Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon and other centres. "A few weeks ago," said Mr. Brown, "very great anxiety was entertained by the banks with reference to the wheat crops of these Provinces. Reports from country points showed that the prospects were good in many respects, but the grain was very green. The weather had been exceptionally cool and the growth had been slow."

"The anxiety with reference to the crop is now gone. In a large part of Manitoba one-half of the wheat is down and the other half is ready to come down. In the last few weeks there has been an extraordinary change in conditions. On the first of August our reports showed that 71 per cent. of the crop would be ready for cutting by August 25, and on August 14 our report showed that 77 per cent. would be ready by August 25. This indicated that the crop of the country was practically safe. About August 1 our reports indicated that 9 per cent. of the crop would come in later than September 1. On August 7 this was reduced to 7 per cent., and on August 14 it was reduced to 5 per cent. On Saturday night of this week 60 per cent. of all the wheat in Manitoba will be cut. On the way from Brandon to Winnipeg all the grain that we saw along the Canadian Northern Railway was down, or ready to come down. In the country south of Saskatoon half of the grain is cut and reapers are going night and day."

Turning Bells into Shells.

The Austrians must indeed be running desperately short of metal for munitions if, as is reported from Geneva, the Government have decided to melt down the great bell in St. Stephen's, Vienna. This bell is rather more than two centuries old, it having been cast in 1711 from cannon captured. It is interesting at this juncture to note, from the Turkish army, which all but captured Vienna in 1683. Should it be melted down, it will provide the Austrians with 17 tons 14 cwt. of bronze, and when that is exhausted the bell in Olmutz Cathedral will, similarly treated, supply almost exactly the same amount of metal. If church bells are to be the deciding factor of the war, Russia will stand a good chance of proving victorious, as there are four bells in Moscow alone which contain between 322 tons of bronze, the biggest weighing 200 tons, or, roughly, six times the combined weight of the two Austrian bells.

Russia is showing commendable wisdom in taking into account the social instinct which, with the removal of the saloon, begins to look about not so much for the drink as for a place of friendly congregation. As a substitute for vodka shops, which have been abolished, there have been erected in the open places throughout Russia "people's places" and smaller buildings, where people may meet for entertainment and instruction. In the government of Portava alone three hundred such places have been opened or projected. They contain reading rooms and halls in which concerts, exhibitions and other entertainments can be given. Temperance reformers in our own country would do well to take a leaf out of Russia's experience. In closing the saloon and prohibiting drink, the provision of a cheerful room for social purposes, supplied with reading matter, games, etc., would be found to be a great aid in enforcing the law.
