Drowning Tragedy Barely Averted

At Southside This Morning—Prompt Rescue of Two Children by Two Citizens.

The lives of two children, a brother and sister named King, of the Lower Southside, came near closing prematurely this morning. About nine o'clock they left home to go to school. While on route they had to cross over Prowse's wharf, situated between the Imperial Oil Co.'s and Gorton Pow Co.'s premises. The wharf was coated with ice on which the little girl slipped, falling into the water. Her little brother was powerless to rescue her alone, but he did the next best thing and he held on like grim death to her by the back of the dress, keeping her head above the surface, as he cried loudly for help. Messrs. Thomas Kearsey and Charles Guzewell, employees of the Imperial Oil Co., heard the alarm, and rushed to the water-front. Meanwhile to make matters more serious the boy got in the water by either losing his equilibrium while holding on to his sister or being pulled in by her. However, on reaching the scene the two men lost no time in rescuing the children, who were all but exhausted. In all probability they would have drowned each other ere another few moments elapsed, as they were clinging tightly to each other when first seen by their rescuers. The children apparently felt the effects of the icy-cold and sudden immersion, and were immediately wrapped in blankets and given hot drinks, after their wet clothing were removed, at their home. Undoubtedly, we are informed, but for the promptitude of the two citizens mentioned, a double drowning tragedy would have occurred.

Capt. Bob Bartlett Gets Important Position.

By the last American mail word was received that Capt. Bob Bartlett of Arctic fame had been appointed by the American Government to the important position of Marine Superintendent at the port of New York. He will also perform special duties in connection with the transports taking troops to France. Captain Bob was among the first to volunteer when the U. S. declared war on Germany and has ever since been at the command of the Government. Capt. Bartlett's vast experience as a master mariner and explorer will be of great assistance to him in performing his arduous duties.

No More Smallpox.

The two patients who developed the disease there a fortnight ago, are being attended by Dr. Levisconte, who is endeavouring to stamp out the malady. THE GLORY OF PASCHENDAELE.

CANADIAN HEADQUARTERS.

IN FRANCE, To-Day.

The story of Paschendaele is one of the enemy's severe casualties, steady loss of ground and declining morale. The Canadian Corps has moved steadily to its objectives, capturing during the several battles 1,174 prisoners, including two battalion commanders. Over two dozen attacks and counter attacks have been broken up in the last three weeks by our men. Our line overlooks Heiberg Spur, Roulers Plain, Moorslede and a green rolling country of farms and villages seemingly untouched by war. Behind us are Houthell, Markt, Meethchele, Bellevue, Crest Farm, lone mounds of concrete that were enemy pill boxes, blasted trees, mud and devastation. Enemy shells are blasting Paschendaele, our guns are blasting his, while our men are toiling to strengthen their positions in the mud. From Paschendaele, to Ypres a mist hangs over the land, veiling the desolation. Our men have won their way through the valley of the shadow that is the salient to the heights that represent the domination and crown of their great achievement. The dead of the Empire lie in the valley, the dead of three years, our dead of Langemarck and St. Julien, of yesterday and of to-day. Because of them and the living who fought with them and followed after them the ridge is ours. The triumph that is Paschendaele is shared by all. The shadow over the salient is lifting. Up to the ridge and on to the ridge, the Canadian Corps stormed its way in a remarkable series of battles. When I arrived in France on Oct. 20th the Corps had just moved into the salient. In the room at headquarters I was told: Our objective is Paschendaele; we will take it in three steps. The first will carry us on to Bellevue Spur, the second will take us to Crest Farm and Meethchele, the third will give us the village. Our first attack will be on Oct. 25th, our second about the 1st of November, and the third five or six days later. It was a striking prophecy, strikingly fulfilled. Canada knows now how the schedule was observed. It could be known before, for it is only possible to tell the story of how the Corps moved up its men, its munitions, its guns, equipment and supplies and smashed its way on time through the enemy defences held by troops without peers in the Central Empires. There has been praise for the infantry and praise for the artillery; there should be praise for the staff. For this taking of Paschendaele has been the triumph of staff work in the great departments of the G. H. Q. and other vital branches behind the lines, as well as of combat arms. The whole Corps was moved as a man might move pieces on a checkerboard. The battalions went forward, all supplies essential to the offensive were relieved and went forward again, victory following victory. Light and heavy guns were brought up over roads that were broken for their coming. They were lodged on temporary foundations on mud, bottoms between yawning shell holes, then moved forward again with the advance. Paschendaele has been the triumph of the mind as well as of the men and guns, the triumph of mind and co-operation between the different services working together with precision towards the common end. Bellevue Spur and the first footing on the ridge of Crest Farm and Meethchele and Paschendaele were three battles and three victories, as planned. The achievement has been great. The cost has been heavy. Many noble men of yours had died for Canada. "If you break faith with us who die, we shall not sleep, though poppies blow in Flanders fields."

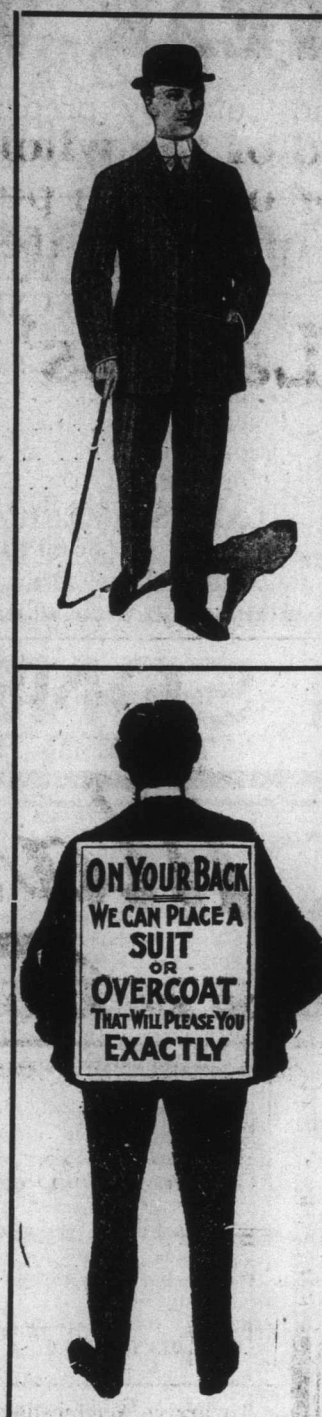

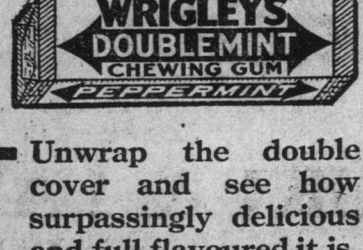
