The King's Pleasures.

If you asked the king what he liked best, it is fairly certain that he would reply, "A good day's shooting."

On the one occasion on which the writer had the opportunity of a chat with His Majesty his talk was almost entirely of shooting. It was very plain that his whole heart was in this sport. He does not despise fishing, and has killed many a spring salmon on Scottish rivers, fishing sometimes as early as February, when often the cold is so bitter that the water freezes on the line, making it most difficult to cast a fly.

Though intensely keen on naval affairs, the King cares little for yachting, and he has not his father's delight in racing. He likes to ride a good horse, but was never very fond of hunting.

His main outdoor taste is farming. It is a curious thing that the main ambition of most sea captains is to settle ashore on a farm. If the King were a private gentleman he would most certainly farm his own land, and do it uncommonly well, too.

Plays Good Tennis.

Of outdoor games lawn tennis is His Majesty's favourite. He is a man with a delicate digestion, and needs plenty of exercise. Right up to the outbreak of war he played tennis almost every day—in summer in the open, in winter on a covered court. He sometimes would play half a dozen sets in an afternoon. Since his accident in France, when his horse fell upon him, his activities in this direction have been somewhat lessened. Besides, he has had no leisure. There is probably not one of his subjects who is so overworked as the King.

He plays a sound game of tennis, and though he has not a very strong service is good at the net.

Golf he has never taken to, though both the Prince of Wales and Prince Albert are fond of the game.

The King's delight in stamps is well known. In this matter he is no amateur, but goes in seriously for the study of philately. So long ago as 1903, he was asked by Sir William Mulock, then Postmaster-General of Canada, to give his advice on the preparation of a new die for Canadian stamps. He at once undertook the task, and as the "London Philatelist" said at the time, the design showing King Edward in his coronation robes, was far and away the best that had appeared in stamp form.

Collects Babies' Photos.

King George's collection of stamps is estimated to be worth at least £20,000.

Of stamps collecting he once wrote to a personal friend, "It is one of the greatest pleasures of my life."

Another indoor pursuit of the King is billiards. He likes an occasional game, but has never had time for sufficient practice to be sure of exceeding a break of twenty.

A curious hobby of His Majesty is the collection of babies' photographs. But then there is no man alive more fond of children than he, and not a better father among all his subjects.

As may be imagined, the King has little leisure for reading. True, he keeps well abreast with the news of the day, but apart from that, almost his only literature is books on travel and exploration. He frequently studies the reports of the Geographical Society.

The King's tastes in the matter of food are very simple and very English. He is fond of a good English cheese, and cares little for fancy cookery. At dinner he drinks a light wine or whiskey and soda. He cares nothing for champagne, and rarely if ever touches port.

He smokes cigars, a choice but mild brand, and used to consume as many as a dozen in the day, but of late smokes less than he once did.

Press Briefs.

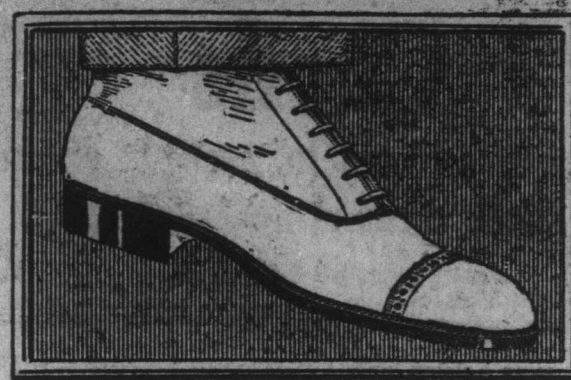
In Sweden the public houses are closed on Saturday—pay day—while the savings banks are kept open until midnight.

With an ordinary jackknife, Dominique Pelletier, of Providence, R. I., has made a wooden model of a sedan touring car, 14 inches high and 3 feet long, with the equipment inside and out complete in every detail. A four-cylinder engine of wood has small copper wires running from the "spark plug" to the "distributor." The removable hood has curved ventilating flanges on the side, and a wooden bumper in front with a square wheel in the rear marks the vehicle as one "fully equipped for touring." The car is also equipped with lighting facilities, a small battery concealed in under the floor furnishing lights for headlights and the special tonneau light that is built into the top. A dust pan is included in the construction of the car.
