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## Shamrock IV Loses to Resolute on Time Allowance

Challenger First to Cross Finish Line---Had to Concede Handicap---Allies Will Support Poland---British Assist Greeks Against Turks---Dublin Trainmen Refuse to Carry Police.

### SANDY HOOK, July 21. Resolute Wins.

#### THE YACHT RACE.

SANDY HOOK, July 21. The Shamrock crossed the starting line at 10.22. The Resolute followed at 10.41.

SANDY HOOK, July 21. At 1.25 the Shamrock lead by one eighth of a mile.

SANDY HOOK, July 21. The Shamrock crossed the line first, lost to-day's race on the Resolute's allowance.

SANDY HOOK, July 21. The Resolute, defender of America's Fighting Cup, came back to-day after straight defeats and won over the British challenger, Shamrock Four. The Shamrock finished scant half a mile ahead with a lead of sixteen seconds, but as she had gained perceptibly at the start some advantage, the race was miraculous. Yachting events, a dead heat over thirty mile course. The Resolute won by the amount of her handicap in minutes and one second. The fifth race of the series will be started Friday. Veteran yachtsmen followed the trim craft through hours, three minutes and six seconds of racing time, thought back many years of racing without being able to conjure up a picture that could compare with to-day's spectacle. It was a real yacht race from the start and it provided a rivalling in closeness that of a neck and neck race. The Resolute took the lead only in her favorite fifteen mile heat to windward rounded the "stake" with about quarter of a mile lead. She slipped slightly down wind with spinnaker and balloon jib topsail billowing supply. But Shamrock with her great spread of canvas would not be fazed, and slowly but surely ate up the intervening distance until, with a mile more than a mile to go, her warship reached then slowly began creep past the Resolute's stern inch by inch as the spectators watched breathlessly the Shamrock moved up and up. A mile from the stake they were running neck and neck rough fluffy little whitecaps turned by the breeze. They appeared so close together from the press boats that it seemed as if a man might have jumped from the challenger to the defender. The Shamrock kept a steady crawl ahead until at the half

mile mark from the line she was nearly a full boat length ahead. Then the Resolute caught a tiny extra puff of wind from somewhere and straining like a thoroughbred under leash crept up slowly and almost imperceptibly. She got her bow about even with the Shamrock's towering mast when a puff of steam from the committee boat's whistle registered the Shamrock's finish.

#### LLOYD GEORGE ON SOVIET MESSAGE.

LONDON, July 21. Continuing his address in the House of Commons to-day on the Soviet answer to the Allies regarding peace with Poland, Premier Lloyd George declared that the Soviet Government also wanted to give Poland better boundaries than those named by the Allies. Lloyd George said there were some phases in the Soviet message indicating the Bolsheviks only were prepared to discuss the matter with a proletrarian Government. He declared the Soviet Government had no right to dictate to Poland what sort of Government the Poles should have. The Premier asserted that an independent Poland was essential to the whole fabric of peace and the Allies were resolved that they arrest the destruction of Poland and the march of the Bolshevik armies through Polish territory. If the Bolsheviks overran Poland they would be up against the German frontier and Lloyd George said this would furnish Germany a great temptation with her millions of trained men. It would be a cheap way, according to the Premier, to get out of her obligations. "I only ask members to think whether it might not have the effect of depriving the Allies of the fruits of a dearly bought victory," Lloyd George added. Lloyd George further pointed out that the Soviet Government had not been chosen by the Russian people and he declared that it was as great an authority as its predecessor. The Premier announced that the British Ambassador at Berlin had gone to Poland and said it was possible that Marshal Pock would go later. It was to the interest of Great Britain and to Europe that Poland should not be wiped out, declared the Premier.

#### TURKISH RESISTANCE CRUSHED.

LONDON, July 21. A Greek communication received this evening announces that the Greeks, supported by British and Greek fleets, have occupied Beracles and Rodosto, and that all Turkish resistance has been crushed.

#### WOULDN'T CARRY POLICE.

DUBLIN, July 21. The Kingsbridge terminus was the scene of unusual animation to-day when thousands of passengers for the Curragh races and other destinations were held up because trainmen refused to carry the thirty armed policemen

bound for Kildare. The police boarded a succession of trains, but on each occasion the driver refused to work and only one express for Killarney departed, the police not attempting to board it.

#### GERMANY NEUTRAL.

BERLIN, July 21. An official statement was issued to-day declaring Germany's complete neutrality in the situation arising from the hostilities in progress between Poland and Russia. The statement was signed by President Ebert and Foreign Minister Simons.

#### HEAVILY FINED.

TORONTO, July 21. Antonio D'Angelo was fined twelve hundred dollars and costs and sent to jail for three months for breaches of the Ontario Temperance Act.

#### UP FOR COURT-MARTIAL.

NEW YORK, July 21. Colonel John E. Hunt, the commander of Castle William Prison here, faces open trial by Court Martial, charged with responsibility for the escape of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, the millionaire draft evader.

#### STREET CAR WORKERS AND POPULACE CLASH.

LONDON, July 21. The Central Press learns from Rome that a serious clash between the populace and street car workers occurred yesterday when the latter, returning from a strike, decorated the cars with Bolshevik banners. The service is again suspended.

#### MCGILL HONOURS JOURNALISTS.

MONTREAL, July 21. McGill University will recognize the service of the public press by conferring the Doctorate of Laws on Viscount Burnham and Harry Brittain of London, Ralph Stapleton Ward Jackson of Johannesburg, and Thomas Wilson, Lords of Auckland, New Zealand, at a special convocation on the occasion of the visit here of the British Imperial Press Delegates.

#### RUSSELL'S APPEAL DISMISSED.

LONDON, July 21. In the appeal of the Winnipeg Labor Leaders to the Privy Council, the petition of Russell was dismissed without the respondents being called.

#### GOVERNORS DISAGREE--MAN HANGS.

PITTSBURG, Miss., July 21. After the acting Governor had commuted the sentence of Charles Ivey, sixty-five year old murderer of Love Vagwell to life imprisonment, the Governor returned and rescinded the order and Ivey was hanged.

#### PLOT DISCOVERED IN CONSTANTINOPLE.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 21. Wholesale arrests were made to-day in connection with an alleged plot to promote a general uprising of Moslems against foreign occupation.

#### LIFTON TO VISIT TORONTO.

ABOARD STEAM YACHT VICTORIA, July 21. It was announced this afternoon that Sir Thomas Lipton will go to Toronto on completion of the race series, having accepted an invitation from the Royal Canadian Yacht Club to attend a special fête in his honour.

#### CANADIAN RAILWAYMEN WOULD NOT ACCEPT.

TORONTO, July 21. The opinion in railway brotherhood circles is that Canadian railway workers would not be satisfied with increases similar to those granted recently to the United States workers.

#### A CHEERING SURPRISE.

LONDON, July 21. The Shamrock's success comes as a cheering surprise to British newspapers, who believed Lipton had little or no chance to lift the cup.

#### BRITAIN LEADS.

LONDON, July 21. The total tonnage now building in the United Kingdom exceeds the amount under construction in the United States by one million, six hundred and seventy-two thousand tons, according to Lloyds.

#### EUGENIE IN LAST RESTING PLACE.

FARNBOROUGH, England, July 21. The body of former Empress Eugenie

was entombed here yesterday between the tombs of her husband, Napoleon III, and her son, the Prince Imperial, in the presence of the Kings and Queens of Britain and Spain.

#### TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE.

LONDON, July 21. The Dublin correspondent of the Daily Mail says the Sinn Fein and British Governments are prepared to discuss, if not already discussing, a basis of settlement of the Irish question. He says the alarming increase of violence in Ireland is frightening the Sinn Fein leaders, many of whom appear ready to listen to any generous offer from Downing Street.

#### POLAND WARLIKE.

WARSAW, July 21. The war spirit dominates Poland and half a million will respond to the call for troops, if it does, the people believing the Armistice does not mean peace.

#### PROBABLY UNNECESSARY.

CORK, July 21. A proclamation issued by General Strickland, commander in Southern Ireland, prohibiting meetings and processions within three miles of the General Post Office will affect many important fixtures, including the city regatta and has caused a sensation.

#### BISHOP OF FERNS PUTS HIS FOOT DOWN.

LONDON, July 21. Dublin Nationalist papers announce that the Roman Catholic Bishop of Ferns, County Wexford, has prohibited the clergy of his diocese from participating in Sinn Fein arbitration courts and from collecting money in Churches in aid of the striking rail-roadmen.

#### GREEKS OCCUPY EASTERN THRACE.

SALONIKA, July 21. Greek troops have commenced their advance in occupation of Eastern Thrace, according to an official announcement here to-day. Telegraphic and railroad communication has been suspended between Constantinople and the interior, the announcement adds.

"A man is young," said the doctor, "because he plays; he doesn't play because he is young. He is the product of his own actions. The old man who sits down after dinner, grouchy because the children make a noise, has already 'passed on.' He ought to be Orlinized. All he is worth to the family is the pay cheque he brings home."

"But look at mother, who plays games with the children, sympathizes with them in their troubles and has a part in all they do. She remains flexible; she hasn't had time to grow old. 'It is dangerous for some men to retire from business. You know the kind who work at a high tension for long years doing nothing but strive

for money. They get it and then announce their retirement; a little later you read a nice obituary saying what a success they had made. They hadn't. 'To keep young one must do young things. Don't be too dignified to play baseball, old cat, leap frog or other lively things which keep the muscles in trim. Have young associates and be a boy with them. Spend time each day studying to be young. Fish, hunt, golf, if you like it, and don't cry quits the first time a muscle twinges; get into the game harder and go to the gym to work out the ache, or play with the kids until you forget it. 'Take youth with you as you go toward old age. You can lead Father Time a merry race by thinking young, playing young and keeping physically fit.'"

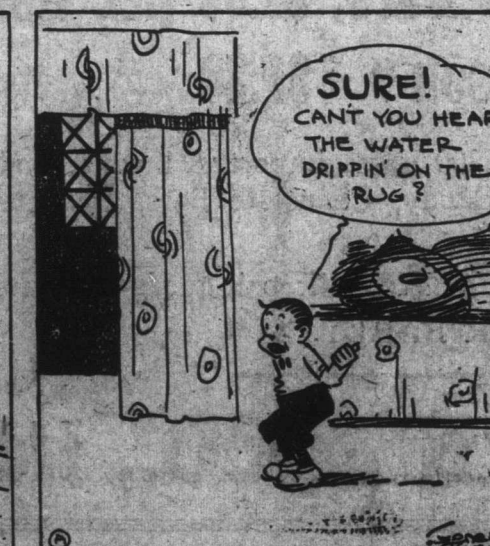
