To-day's Messages.

FORCING AN ISSUE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. Elated by their tie-up of virtually every British ship in New York, two thousand or more longshoremen, who suddenly quit work to-day, expect to spread their walkout to every port in the United States in the hope of forcing Great Britain to release from jail Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, and permit Archbishop Mannix to land on Irish soil. Women pickets, who inspired the longshoremen and marine firemen, water tenders and oilers, who joined them, felt the same way about it and are not going back to work on British ships, they said, until Great Britain meets their wishes. At the call of their Irish comrades, men of other nationalities also quit work, and twelve big ocean liners are tied up.

BEDOUINS MURDER CHRISTIANS.

CAIRO, Aug. 27. One hundred and fifty Christians have been killed at a village, about fifty miles northeast of Jerusalem, by a band of Bedouins, according to a despatch received here from Haifa, Palestine. Another despatch states that in recent Bedouin raids on a train near Damascus, an Italian naval officer was among the killed.

ASSASSINATED BY FANATIC.

SIMLA, Aug. 27. Deputy Commissioner Willoughby has been assassinated in his residence at Kheri, province of Oudh, by a Musselman fanatic. The assassin, who was aided by accomplices, entered the residence of the Commissioner when all the servants were absent.

SOVIET NOTE IMPERTINENT.

LONDON, Aug. 27. The following despatch from Lucerne was received by the London times: "Premier Lloyd George has received the Soviet Note, and the impression created by it is not a satisfactory one. The tone of the communication is considered to verge on studied impertinence. The Note will be the subject of an exchange of views between London, Paris and Rome. It is expected that Premier Lloyd George will remain here another week."

FOR MacSWINEY'S RELEASE.

LONDON, Aug. 27. Premier Lloyd George, at Lucerne, is being bombarded with appeals in behalf of Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, who is on a hunger strike in prison. The general tenor of the appeals is that a show of clemency in this case will open the gate for reconciliation with Ireland, while a refusal would have the opposite effect. A strongly worded letter from James O'Grady, member of the House of Commons, also has been received.

STRIKE ADVOCATES IN MAJORITY.

LONDON, Aug. 28. The threatened strike of coal miners continues to engross the attention of newspapers and public. Rattling in South Wales, on the question of whether the men shall strike, has virtually been concluded, and the result of the balloting, announced early to-day, is as follows: In favor of striking, 143,000; against striking, 42,000. This gives considerably more than a two-thirds majority in South Wales district in favor of the men ceasing work.

REVIVAL OF '49.

PORCUPINE, Ont., Aug. 28. Sensational and gigantic developments are believed to be due in the near future in Northern Ontario, particularly in the Porcupine district, where gold deposits are thought to greatly exceed anything ever before found.

NO CHANGE IN POLICY.

LONDON, Aug. 28. Premier Watos has notified the Russian Soviet Government that the Polish victory has produced no change in the intentions of the Polish Government, a Warsaw despatch to the Times states.

INVOLVING GERMANY.

PARIS, Aug. 28. Bolshevik batteries, stationed on German soil, have fired on Polish troops, says a Polish official communication issued Thursday.

ONE SHIP CLEARED.

ANTWERP, Aug. 28. A United States steamer with munitions for Poland, left here yesterday for Danzig.

GREAT BRITAIN WON.

ANTWERP, Aug. 28. In the water polo final yesterday, Great Britain defeated Belgium by three against two.

WORLD'S SCULLING CHAMPION.

LONDON, Aug. 23. Ernest Barry, won the sculling championship of the world from Arthur Panton, in Australia, to-day, by twelve lengths.

WARSHIPS AT DANZIG.

BERLIN, Aug. 28. A squadron of four small British armoured cruisers, accompanied by several small auxiliary vessels, has

arrived and anchored in Danzig Bay. It is said there are two other British warships and two French armoured cruisers in the port.

CRASHING TO A FALL.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 28. Advice from Petrograd to the Berlingske Tidende state that conditions there are becoming critical, and that the fall of Soviet Government appears imminent.

Labor and Russia.

The "Hands off Russia" slogan is an indication of the dangerous Bolshevik propaganda still being carried on by the agents of the Soviet. The fact that labor meetings at Winnipeg can still be worked upon to pass resolutions which play into the hands of these trouble makers is an indication that the menace of Sovietism in Canada has not yet been overcome. The fact, too, that 83 per cent. of the members of the Street Railwaymen's Union at Winnipeg are said to have joined the One Big Union is further evidence that the conspirators are still active in Canada, and particularly in the West.

The agitation against interference in Russia continues despite repeated assurances that no such course is contemplated by the British Government. In fact there is no difference between the policy of the British Government and that of the Labor conference. But this does not dispose of the clever use of that insidious cry, "Hands off Russia." As Lloyd George has so effectively put it, the agitators are swinging a sledge hammer at an open door.

A strike by labor in England to-day would be playing into the hands of the European "Reds" just as a demonstration at Winnipeg or any other Canadian city would.—Financial Post.

A Job for Someone.
