They know that the history of Haiti has been one long record of blood-stained oppression, misery and confusion and that under American direction its wretched peoples are being given their first glimpse of order and security. They know-at least the people of Great Britain know, having had some experience in dealing with na tive populations,-that very regret able things sometimes happen, and that the man on the spot, particularly if he inherit the military tradition and be suddenly brought face to face with a crisis, does not always act with the restraint and suavity of the trained diplomat. Sometimes there is no time. Sometimes he believes that immediate sterness may prevent the spread of trouble and the neces sity of greater and more widespread severity. Sometimes he is guilty of a plain blunder-a thing not wholly unknown to the best of us.

Whatever be the consequence other nations are not going to accuse the United States of a policy of bloody oppression in Haiti. In any event, let us hope that the incident may tend to curb a little the poisonous activities of the anti-British propaganda in the United States .- Montreal Daily Star.
