## TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

**THEORETICAL GOVERNMENT.** DUBLIN, May 21. At a session of Dail Eireann, held at the second week in May, says an official report issued by that body last night, it was decided on the President's motion that the then parliamentary elections should be regarded as elections to Dail Eireann, and that present "Republican" Parliament will automatically dissolve as soon as the new body is duly summoned.

## CAIRENS RIOT.

CAIRO, May 21. Rioting more severe than that which took place yesterday, broke out yesterday. Police fought the mob for three hours and, unable to disperse it, called for the help of cavalry forces. There were numerous casualties.

## FRANCE GIVES ORDERS.

BERLIN, May 21. It was announced that the foreign Minister yesterday had drawn up without reservation, the Government's declaration on the disarmament of Germany, as demanded under terms of the recent ultimatum of the Allies. The Ministry of France, on May 13, issued orders for the surrender of guns and other weapons, and war materials at unauthorized fortresses, and yesterday gave other orders regarding disarmament as demanded by the Allies.

## DEADLY POLITICS.

ROME, May 21. Three persons are dead, two are dying and many are suffering from wounds, as the result of a pitched battle between communists and extremists at Chiuri, Tuscany, where post election disorders continue.

## MARKING TIME.

LONDON, May 21. Mr. Lloyd George has gone to Hythe, near Dover, where he will spend the week-end with Sir Philip Sassoon. Advice received from Sillesia would appear to indicate that neither Poles nor Germans are taking the offensive. Pending a meeting of the French and British Premiers, the proposed action of the Supreme Allied Council for the purpose of discussing Sillesia, appeared today to have been pushed indefinitely into the future.

## ON BODY FOUND IN CELLAR.

The post mortem on the body of the child found last night at 8.30 o'clock in a cellar, as reported in another column, was conducted by Dr. Tait shortly after the corpse had been taken to the morgue. The body was in so decomposed a state that it was impossible to discover its age, sex or the cause of death. It was, however, a fully developed child. According to the doctor's report the body must have been lying in the cellar since last fall as it had been placed there in the winter, it would have been frozen. The police are not prepared to say just yet on what they are basing their investigations, but they are confident of effecting an arrest shortly.

## Tottering Government Railroads.

("Wall Street Journal.") It has been the happy lot of one of the Canadian papers, while hopefully advocating government railway operation, to group and propound the most formidable objections to it. The occasion was the recent annual statement of the privately-owned and managed Canadian Pacific. The necessity was to confess and avoid its consequences.

Canadian Pacific was constructed when labor and material were cheap. Lines built in later years did not have these singular advantages. The admission itself concedes little. The 1880-1883 level of prices was not greatly different from that of 1887-1891. In so far as it varied from the later level, or from that of 1909-1913, its economic difficulties were similar, except only where they were greater.

Labor was cheaper, material was cheaper, but both were equally if not more difficult to finance. The West was a wilderness of raw material in the form of land. No pioneer transport system had quickened its health, invited competition and afforded physical facilities for new roads. The East had a small commercial and manufacturing interest, barely and no more than adequately weathering its own adversities. Labor and material were as hard to buy then as now—indeed harder.

Out side of some museum or park exhibit of an engine, is there left anywhere a rail, angle-iron, sleeper, car or part of car or of an engine, now in use in the form of 35 years ago? Perhaps no corporation ever organized has more carefully maintained its wear and tear equipment down to the smallest bolt or part.

Since the Government venture, the most costly, most imposingly extravagant of the transcontinental was thrown across the head waters of the Great Lakes—a matter of ten years ago—Canadian Pacific has had to replace its mileage, its equipment, its transport facilities virtually throughout. It has had to replace it in markets under enormous price inflation.

There remains revenue from its land sales and other investments. The latter were the direct product of private ownership. Precisely such "valuable extraneous revenues" might eventually have accrued to the Canadian Northern conservatively developed. But not now. No democracy has ever existed which could forget a Government surplus, or keep hands off it.

It is the thorough account taken of just these bits which has broken down the theory of Government railroad ownership and operation even in darkest Russia.

## Jazz Originated by the Incas of Peru.

New York.—(Associated Press)—The shimmy, the one-step and the jazz music are as old as the hills and the ancient melody-loving inhabitants of Peru were the first to produce them. And to make their claim secure for all time they inscribed the figures of the dance on their prehistoric pottery and metal so that when future archaeologists sought proof of their claim there would be no doubt about it.

Sure enough, their claim to fame as the originators of the trots that make life worth living for a lot of light footed persons, has been found by Charles W. Nease, assistant curator of the department of Anthropology in the Natural History.

This discovery, incidentally, blasts the theory that jazz was first a product of the now extinct Barbary Coast in San Francisco, where adventures

With Carpenter it is different. The slender Frenchman believes in secrecy. He deals in mystery and does most of his real work behind closed doors. When Georges was preparing for his affair with Joe Beckett, he hid himself away in the country and would permit not permit visitors to enter the gym while he was working. He caused reports to be sent out that he was having all kinds of trouble with his condition and that he was a war-worn wreck.
