RAIDS ON STORES THREATENED. It is reported fro mthe West Coast that there is a good deal of destitu-tion and poverty in the Port au Port division of St. George's District, notwithstanding the large orders for pulp wood that were awarded to contractors in that section early in the winter. The store of Joy & Company who do business at Port au Port proper was broken into several times within the past six months and flour and provisions taken. It is said that an open raid on the stores was threatened quite recently, which was averted by the tact and firmness of Rev. Fr. DuBourdieu, who has temporary charge of that parish during the win-
