

Fishermen's Movement.

PUBLIC MEETING AT BRIGUS—RESOLUTIONS UNANIMOUSLY PASSED.

The public meeting held at Brigus on Friday night in support of the new movement was one of the most successful ever held at that place. The hall was crowded to capacity. Capt. William Bartlett, Sr., presided, and interesting addresses were delivered by the three delegates, Messrs. Frank Jones, Joshua Winsor and Captain Robert Roberts. After they had concluded the resolutions calling for reduction of taxation, reduction of expenditure, etc., were read by the Chairman. The following addresses were given by Messrs. W. Hiscock, N. Smith, J. Henderson, J. Chalkley, J. P. Hearn and B. Ryan. All the speakers were warmly applauded and the large audience unanimously voiced their support of the resolutions. A strong Committee was formed to co-operate with the movement and keep the good work going. The delegates were given a splendid reception by the people and their appreciation of the kindness bestowed upon them.

WATER COVE ENDORSES MOVEMENT AT PUBLIC MEETING.

Water Cove, the once very prosperous western fishing settlement has entered in no uncertain manner the movement for the reduction of taxation, retrenchment and abolition of high salaries, abolition of unnecessary departments and immediate opening of the House of Assembly for despatch of business. On Saturday last a public meeting was held by some of the residents and delegates who are in the city were invited to attend. The hall was packed to capacity. Mr. Noseworthy called the meeting to order and asked to have the Chairman appointed. Mr. Alex. H. H. was appointed and after making a few remarks welcoming the delegates on behalf of the citizens called on Captain Jesse Winsor to address the meeting. Then followed Messrs. J. Sainsbury, Green, Stewart and J. W. H. Revs. Tulk and Moore. Several residents also spoke. Mr. H. then read the resolutions which were moved, seconded and passed unanimously. A vote of thanks was especially given the delegation and the meeting strong appeals were made for them to stay and spend Sunday. The reception given the delegates was one that will long be remembered. Bunting was flying everywhere, and as their entering the village they were greeted with volleys of musketry. The send-off was marked by spontaneous outbursts of cheering, and good wishes for the success of the movement.
