But really, our neighbour of the Times has a sad case on hand, which he has been championing for a length of time past, and yet finds all his weeping and wailing of no avail.
It appears that sometime last summer a Mr. Brodie, from somewhere, was brought into the County of Wellington at the instigation of friends of the Government to value a certain description of unpatented lands, and the first we heard of him was through the Mercury, which stated that he was doing double duty—valuing lands for his pay, and canvassing votes for Mr. Drew for his gratitude. The result was, that the present Government thought, as that gentleman was appointed without the sanction of the member for the County, but to serve the purpose of their opponents, so the time had arrived when the people's representatives ought to have a voice in the matter—Mr. Brodie was dispensed with as a government official, and another has taken his place who will perform his duty at least equally well, and be able to mind his own business.
This is a great grievance, it is a matter that requires being rectified immediately, a grievous oppression not to be borne; to think that a local job of ever so temporary a character should be performed in the County by one of its residents, and on the nomination of the County representatives, is really too great an outrage to be quietly borne and although no redress is expected at the hands of the Government, a wall throughout the Province may induce the unjust judge to listen, and justice be thus obtained for the martyred land valuator Mr. Brodie. As to what those pure-minded Conservatives might do under reverse circumstances is not the question at present—they are sick and not likely soon to recover from their malady in Ontario—they find a devoted friend spoiled in his little game, they see that the trick is played out, and they have a holy indignation of the means employed to stop it. Why indeed should they not hold every office, great and small, why should patronage be conferred on any other but their friends, or by any hands but their own? For once the tables are turned and the injustice is great: now they can do nothing but bewail their condition and lament their opponents. So long as they could use Crown Land influence in their favor, as in the case of Mr. Landman, all was right; so long as their friend could traverse this County at the public expense, all right—when these things cease all wrong. Well, shout boys, shout! for it's all you can now do; but no one will credit you for the very high and conscientious principles you so loudly profess.—*Edna O'Brien.*
