It is but fair to note that the editors of the Journal de Quebce, is particularly inimical to him, because of various disappointments, such as not getting the Lieut. Governorship of Quebec, &c, which have driven the latter into the ranks of the Opposition. Nevertheless this sound of discord is ominous, and seems to indicate that the potent spell which banded Lower Canadian members together behind a leader is broken.
