Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and Hamilton have banded together and formed a professional league and their schedule has been drawn up and published. This includes 60 games and stretches from May 10 until September 6. But what they do does not directly concern the remainder of the Dominion leagues. What does concern them, however, is the fact that the principals in the D.F.A. have also shown themselves strongly in favor of breaking away from the amateur game. Barter Wants to Rule Things


