#### SERBIAN STORY TO BE TOLD BY VISITOR FROM COUNTRY

Lady in Belgrade During the Bombardment Will Give . Address

It is not often the privilege of the peo ple of Calgary to hear a first hand tale of military forces of the central empires. Speakers who can portray the British attitude to the war we have had in plenty but there is an aspect of the struggle that has not as yet been told to the people of Calgary.

That aspect will be presented on Thursday evening at the Public Library by Miss Helen Losanitch, a Serbian lady, who will address a public meeting. Miss Losanitch tells of the sorrows—and of the humors, too—of her country, from first hand information and personal experience. She was in Belgrade when the bombardment of that city began after the Austrians had been twice thrust back by the Serbian Soldiery. She saw the shell explode in the city, and a few days later from a beight of land above the Danube witnessed the Austrians and Serbians bat-tling on the plains of Hungary. She knows the whole story of the destruction of property and the systematic campaign of loot which accompanied the invasion. The address is said to be always mark-ed with moderation, and at no time does Miss Losanitch induige in any violent criticism of the destroyers of her people. Miss Losanitch is touring on behalf of the Serbian Relief commission and a col-lection will be taken at the public meeting in aid of the Serbian Relief fund. Th our will be 8 o'clock, and it is suggested to the public that they be on hand early as a crowded hall is expected.

#### RED CROSS SUPPLIES CONTINUE ON EVER NEEDED INCREASE

End of September Saw the Equal of Last Year's, Need Greater Than Ever

The contributions in monies and supplies to the Canadian Red Cross society have, in nine months this year, equaled the total contributions of 1916, according notre, the corresponding secto Mrs. Plumptre, the corresponding sec-retary of the Red Cross, who spoke to the foint luncheon of the Canadian clubs on Saturday. Mrs. Plumptre explained gen-erally the workings of the society, paying particular attention to some of the details, such as the information department, the supplying of small luxuries to the men which the government did not set.

Lady Drummond, through the information de-partment, which she had taken charge of and up to recently maintained at her own expense, had done a service to Can-ada which could not easily be repaid. Parcels sent out from those offices in London has amounted some weeks to 12.

HUNTING LUXBURG

Buenos Aires, Oct. 8.—Officials to-day admitted that Count von Lux-burg, the former German minister to Amgentina, is still in the country. His exact location, however, was not made

known.

The admission was forthcoming when it was learned today that a search by a British cruiser of an outward bound ship had failed to locate von Luxburg, who was supposed to have taken passage on the steamer last Friday and sailed from Montevideo.

Montevido, Oct. 8. - A British cruiser stopped an outbound Spanish steamer seven miles off the coast, ac-cording to advices received resterday. The steamer was held up, it is supposed, in the belief that Count von Luxburg, who recently was given his passports, might be on board.


