Europe's Wheat Shortage.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—At the recent meeting of the Millers' Convention at Edinburgh, the following estimates were advanced for the following quarters: Hungary, above average, 1,000,000; Poland, 1,000,000; Rumania, 1,000,000; Bulgaria, below average, 4,000,000; Denmark, 500,000; Germany, good average, 12,000,000; Greece, fair average, 1,500,000; Holland, 1,000,000; Italy, 1,000,000; Norway, 15,000,000; Norway and Sweden, fair average, 50,000,000; Portugal, average, 1,000,000; Spain, 1,000,000; Sweden, 1,000,000; Russia, below average, 30,000,000; Serbia, very poor average, 1,000,000; Turkey, 1,000,000; Switzerland, average, 2,000,000; Turkey, Europe, below average, 4,000,000; Turkey, Asia, below average, 9,000,000; total Europe, 155,700,000 quarters.

The estimated total consumption of Europe is 175,000,000 quarters, so that the deficiency is 19,300,000 quarters.
