When the train arrived there was great cheering, which was again and again renewed when Mr. and Mme. aurier emerged and took their places in Mr. Edwards' four-in-hand, along with Mr. Hutchinson, senior M. P. for the city. The procession, headed by the band of the Governor-General's Foot Guards, started on a long tour of the streets. Another four-in-hand carriage supplied by Mr. F. X.
