THE BLIND CHAPLAIN

Made a Fervent Prayer for Armenia in
Congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—When the
senate was called to order yesterday
morning, Rev. Dr. Milburn, the blind
chaplain, prayed eloquently for bleed-

ing Armenia.

"Hear the cry of our agony," he
prayed, "in behalf of the people of Ar-
menia, despoiled, tortured, their homes
in ashes; their men and women and
children slain at the edge of the sword;
their women dishonored. Arouse and
unite the powers of Christendom, the
queen, the czar, the kaiser, kings
and princes, their ministers and people.
The Sultan shall be forced to sheath
his bloody sword and stay the frenzied
rage of his fanatical soldiery and
subjects."

The House passed by a vote of 143
to 26 the Senate concurrent resolution
declaring it to be an imperative duty
in the interest of humanity to ex-
press the earnest hope that the Euro-
pean concert brought about by the
Berlin treaty may be speedily given
its just effect in such decisive mea-
sures as shall stay the hand of fan-
aticism and lawless violence and to
secure the Christian inhabitants of the
Turkish Empire all the rights be-
longing to them as men and Christians
and as beneficiaries of the explicit
provisions of that treaty; requesting
the President to communicate these
resolutions to the five signatory pow-
ers thereof, and declaring that Con-
gress will support the President in
the most vigorous action he may take
for the protection and security of
American citizens in Turkey and to
obtain redress for injuries committed
upon the persons or property of such
citizens.

Their Escape.
