Mr. John Campbell was asked to speak upon the bonus question. As they were all aware, he said, the object of the society was to prevent any rash expenditures of money upon bonuses. At present several of these had been mooted by the council. There seemed to be a perfect epidemic for expenditure of large sums of money, the greater majority of which the large ratepayers were not prepared to countenance. It was simply absurd, for instance, to think of expending \$200,000 on waterworks. To speak of creeting a new hospital at a probable cost of \$100,000 was equally ridiculous. If the hospital accommodation at present was inadequate an addition good enough for all practical purposes could be erected for a few thousand dollars. The system of granting bonuses was wrong The system of granting bonuses was wron in principle, "Bounses are the confounde ud in existence," asserted Mr. Campbe be set right until the Government enacte a law making the acceptance of a bonus

erime.

Mr. J. M. Parsons safd that he had traveled from one end of the Dominion to the other, and could affirm that there was no prettier or better situated city in Canada than London. He had been asked to speak on the electric light question. If the ioretathers of those present had known that the building of the London and Port Stanley Railway would. London and Port Stanley Railway would have landed the city into an expenditure of nearly a million of money without any appreable returns, they would have hesitated a able returns, they would have hesitated at commencing operations. Taxpayers of the present day should profit by the experience. A long and earnest consideration should be given to the question of an electric light works. As long as the proposition was presented under the present condicions he would vote against it. The annual outlay on an electric light plant had not been satisfactorily stated. After a great deal of figuring he had arrived at the conclusion that this consideration would total up \$14,500, not taking into account insurance, wear and tear and incidentals. At present the cost of the lights was \$22,560, leaving a halance of \$8,060 in favor of ownership. Turning to the water main ownership. Turning to the water main question, Mr. Parsons said that he did not think the city would grow rapidly enough during the nextten years to warrant any suc outlay. There was no necessity for th adoption of such a proposal, any how. Th present supply was entirely adequate existing and expected demands. Too much waste was going on. For instance, if the Grand Trunk Railway Company's use of water was subject to the test of meter, not half the amount they were using (or rather wasting) would be consumed.

Mr. Edmund Meredith remarked that he had joined the association purely from a selfish motive. He found that while the taxes upon his property had been increasing the property was decreasing in value. He

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
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
