Review OF THE SITUATION.

London, Wednesday, June 13.-Two pieces of news encouraging to the British in the official dispatches are that the broken communications of Lord Roberts are in a fair way to be mended by the forces moving northwards and southwards and driving off the roving commandoes, and that Sir Laing's Nek. Telegraphic communica-tion with Lord Roberts is expected to be restored today, as a dispatch from Bloemfontein yesterday says that the railway is in British possession again, and that the work of repairing the line is going on rapidly with the abundant material warehoused at Bloemfontein. A dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez reports the arrival there of Greenberg. the agent of the Creusot works, from the Transvaal, on his way to Europe. He says that Boer resistance is prac-

BOGUS BOER BULLETIN. The Boer government is also issuing news cheering to its sympathizers. The following bulletin, the Boer version of Lord Methuen wrote four Canadian posted by President Kruger on Sunday

London, June 12-9:12 p.m.-The war 1 at Machadodorp: "On June 7 four divisions of burghers, commanded by Steenkamp, Froneman, Duploy, Fourie and Nel, attacked the British at Roodeval, killed 200, took 700 prisoners and captured immense stores of food and ammunition, a Maxim gun and 1,000 lyddite shells. Some food was taken by the Boer farmers and the rest was The English mail was taken. The burghers attacked from the open veldt, and gave evidence of unprecedented bravery.

Gen. Dewet was also fighting on June 6, whether at Roodeval or elsewhere is not clear; but the Boer war office gives it out that he captured 3,000 suits of clothing, blankets, gloves, boots, etc Being unable to carry them with him in his rapid sweep through the country, according to the Transvaal war office, he burned the whole mass. Gen. Dewet has also reported that he put 1,000 British out of action and destroyed property valued at £100,000. As Lord Methuen is officially described as fighting on June 7, it is possible that he was engaging Gen. Dewet.

According to a dispatch to the Daily Express from Machadodorp, dated June 10, via Lorenzo Marquez, those around President Kruger say that Louis Botha and Delarey have been offered indirectly £10,000 a year to lay down their arms, and President Kruger expects the same offer to be made to himself, President Steyn and Dewet. President Kruger believes that the British make these offers to close the war on the principle that it would cost less than to fight it out.

DID LEYDS DECEIVE THEM? Antwerp, June 13.—A correspondent interviewed Dr. Leyds, the diplomatic agent of the Transvaal, on the present situation in South Africa. Dr. Leyds said that it was decided months ago to abandon Pretoria. The fortifications were not prepared for a defense of the city, and it would require too many troops. Besides this, it would not leave any men to harass Gen. Roberts' rear and line of communications. The moral effect of the occupation, Dr. Levds said, was nil.

Despite his declarations, Dr. Leyds' position is becoming untenable. generally believed here that he wilfully deceived the presidents of the two Boer republics by telling them that Euro pean intervention was sure to come. Interest in the war here is declining.

THE CAPE CABINET. Cape Town, June 12.—Premier Schreiner is engaged in reforming the cabinet owing to the resignation of Messrs, Merriman, treasurer: J. Sauer, commissioner of public works, and Dr. Te Water, minister without portfolio. At the recent bond caucus, the premier's policy was generally condemned. The chief point of difference relates to the treatment of rebels. The Bond, led by Messrs. Hoffmeyer and Te Water, desired general amnesty. Mr. Schreiner urged a scheme, recommended by the imperial government. under which a special tribunal will try the rebels. Convicted leaders will be imprisoned and personally disfranchised, and the rank and file will be disfranchised for a period. It is understood Mr. Schreiner's policy will be supported by the entire Loyalist party, which is indorsed by the loyal public opinion of South Africa.

The Canadians.

INVALIDED MEN.

London, June 13 .- The officials returns show that five Canadians invalided home have now returned to South Africa, namely: 7,664, Pte. Martin; 7,393, Corp. Stewart; 7,474, Pte. Colman; 7,852, Pte. Proulx; 7,659, Pte. Moore. One Canadian, Pte. Bateson, 7,020, has joined the Royal Horse Artillery, and Pte. Craig and Pte Beach, 7,179 and 7,021, are on furlough here, instead of drafting them back to South Africa. The war office still continues to send

them to the provisional camp at Shorncliffe to await the development of imperial Canadian plans. The military authorities are at a loss to know what to do with some of these Shorncliffe Canadians. One has become insane. The war office publishes the names of four officers and 43 men who have died from disease in the hospitals, including Lance-Corporal A. F. Vanornan, of the Canadian mounted infantry, who died of enteric fever at Bloemfontein.

several of the inhabitants have expressed gratitude for the peace and order which prevail. After surrendering the city, Botha retired to a place about fifteen miles east on the Middleburg road. He had a small force at first, but during the last few days his numbers increased, and his being so near the town kept up the excitement in the country, prevented the burghers from laying down their arms, and interfered with the collection of supplies. It therefore became necessary to attack him. This I did yesterday. He held a very strong position, practically

UNASSAILABLE IN FRONT, which enabled him to place the main portion of his troops on his flanks, which he knew from former experience were his vunerable parts.
