Buller's Star in

The Ascendant

Fighting a Spirited Advance Over a Rugged Field.

The Enemy Obligated to Abandon Majuba and Laing's Nek-Gens. Kelly-Kenny and Hunter Restoring Lord Roberts' Connections-1,500 Boers Said To Be Gathering at Middleburg-British Casualty Returns Make a Large Total.

London, June 12-9:12 p.m.-The war office has issued the following from Gen. Buller to the secretary of war: "Joubert's Farm, June 12-5:50 p.m. -Encamped four miles north of Volksrust.

"Laing's Nek and Majuba were completely evacuated by the Boers last night.

"Gen. Clerf, from Ingogo, is now coming over the Nek.

"I have had to camp here for want of water.

"A correct list of yesterday's casualties will be sent as soon as received."

London, June 13-4 a.m.-Gen. Buller was unable on Monday to follow up the Boers for lack of cavalry, as well as water. The dispatches describe him as fighting a spirited advance over a rugged field, under prolonged rifle fire. The Boers had two guns, which they got away. Few dead or wounded Boers were found.

WHERE IS METHUEN?
London, June 12.-The following dispatch has been received at the war office from Gen. Forrester-Walker, in command of the lines of communication in South Africa:

"Cape Town, June 12.-The following is from Kelly-Kenny:
"June 11.-No communication from Methuen since June 7. He was fighting June 6 to the north of Vetchkop. Steyn is near Reitz.

"The British prisoners sent to Vrede are well treated."

RESTORING CONNECTION.
London, June 12.-A comparison of Gen. Kelly-Kenny's dispatch, at Honing Spruit, with the maps available shows apparently that the British line of communication, cut by the Boers, has been restored by the movement of troops from the north towards Honing Spruit, to reach which place they would have to pass through Rooodeval if they followed the railroad. The fact that Gen. Kelly-Kenny says Gen. Knox will move out from Kroonstad to "intercept the enemy" would seem to indicate that the Boers are retreating before the northern British force, and that troops from Kroonstad, south of Honing Spruit, have been sent to intercept them, if possible.

GEN. HUNTER.
London, June 13.-From the subjoined telegram, dated Bloemfontein, June 12, it would appear that Gen. Hunter was in command of the troops referred to by Gen. Kelly-Kenny in the above dispatch: "Gen. Hunter is moving up rapidly from the northwest, having severely defeated a large command of Boers who had destroyed two miles of railway north of Kroonstad."

15,000 BOERS GATHERING AT MIDDLEBURG.
A dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez says that 15,000 Boers are reported to be retreating on Middleburg, from various quarters, and that after wedding the faint-hearted, 20,000 steadfast men are still left.

Lord Methuen, Gen. Rundle and Gen. Brabant are reported to have 35,000 men and guns engaged in inclosing the Boers in the eastern part of Orange River Colony.

BRITISH CASUALTY RETURNS.
The war office casualty returns up to June 9 aggregate 23,664, besides 792 officers and 12,356 men sent home as invalids, but not including the sick in South African hospitals.

Review

OF THE SITUATION.
London, Wednesday, June 13.-Two pieces of news encouraging to the British in the official dispatches are that the broken communications of Lord Roberts are in a fair way to be mended by the forces moving northwards and southwards and driving off the roving commandoes, and that Sir Redvers Buller is at last master of Laing's Nek. Telegraphic communication with Lord Roberts is expected to be restored today, as a dispatch from Bloemfontein yesterday says that the railway is in British possession again, and that the work of repairing the line is going on rapidly with the abundant material warehoused at Bloemfontein.

A dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez reports the arrival there of Greenberg, above despatched to the Derbyshire, from the Transvaal, on his way to Europe. He says that Boer resistance is practically over.

BOGUS BOER BULLETIN.
The Boer government is also issuing news cheerfully to its sympathizers. The following bulletin, the Boer version of the disaster to the Derbyshire, was posted by President Kruger on Sunday

Victory!

Won by General's Methuen and Kitchener.

Dewet's Camp Captured and His Force Scattered.

Roberts and Botha Fight a Battle-British Gain Ground, But the Boers Were Not Beaten-Roberts' Line of Communication Restored.

London, June 13.-Lord Roberts' line of communications has been practically restored by

A COMPLETE VICTORY, gained by Gens. Methuen and Kitchener over Gen. Dewet yesterday.

The Boer camp was captured, and the burghers, it is added, were scattered in all directions.

ROBERTS MEETS BOTHA.
Lord Roberts has fought a battle with Gen. Botha, at the end of which, though the British gained considerable ground, the Boers were not beaten.

All is quiet at Pretoria and Johannesburg.

AFTER A WEEK'S SILENCE.
London, June 13.-After a week's silence Lord Roberts has been heard from. Lord Roberts says the government need have no apprehension about the security of the army in South Africa, as it will not take long to remedy reverses and repair the railroad.

DETAILS OF THE BATTLE WITH BOTHA.
A lengthy dispatch, forwarded to the war office by Major-Gen. Knox from Kroonstad, presumably sent there by messenger, reads as follows: Kroonstad, June 12.-We have been requested to forward you from Lord Roberts the following dispatch from the Pretoria residency at 8:08 a.m. today:

Pretoria, June 12.-Pretoria and Johannesburg are perfectly quiet, and several of the inhabitants have expressed gratitude for the peace and order which prevails.

After surrendering the city, Botha retired to a place about fifteen miles east on the Middleburg road. He had a small force at first, but during the last few days his numbers increased, and his being so near the town kept up the excitement in the country, prevented the burghers from laying down their arms, and interfered with the collection of supplies. It therefore became necessary to attack him. This I did yesterday. He held a very strong position, practically

UNASSAILABLE IN FRONT, which enabled him to place the main portion of his troops on his flanks, which he knew from former experience were his vulnerable parts. I sent French with Porter's and Dixon's cavalry brigades and Hutton's mounted infantry round by our left, and Ian Hamilton with Broadwood and Gordon's cavalry brigade, Ridley's mounted infantry and Bruce Hamilton's infantry brigade round by our right. Both columns

MET WITH GREAT OPPOSITION. At about three in the afternoon I saw two of Hamilton's infantry battalions advancing to what appeared to be the key of the enemy's defense on their left flank. This was almost gained before dark, and I ordered the force to bivouac on the ground they had won.
