Legations' Fate Still in Doubt

Severe Fighting at Tien Tsin on 3rd and 4th July.

Torrential Rain Comes to the Relief of the Allies-A Message From the Emperor to the European Powers-Asks Aid in Supporting the Present Government-Japs Sending 63,000 Troops to China—Dispatch From the Governor of Shan Tung Says All the Legations Are Safe Excepting the German-Missionaries Getting Away.

London, Wednesday, July 11.-"No | ed up much anxiety will continue to authentic news from Pekin" is still the burden of the dispatches from the far east, and although the disposition is to believe the optimistic reports from Chinese sources, no real confiif they are still in existence, are permitted to communicate with their governments.

SEVERE FIGHTING AROUND TIEN

TSIN. According to a special Che Foo dispatch, the fighting around Tien Tsin on July 3 and 4 was the severest yet had 75,000 men attacking simultaneousguns. The defenders numbered 14,000, with scant supplies, and it was only the presence of the newly-arrived Japanese and Russian guns that prevented a disaster. One Russian company of infantry, numbering 120 men, had 115 killed or wounded. The German contingent also suffered heavily. n was very critical.

SAVED BY RAIN. The allies narrowly escaped total cereat. Providentially, when things were at their worst, a torrential rainfall compelled the Chinese to retire. On July 6, the rain having abated, the Chinese renewed the attack, opening fire on Tien Tsin with two batteries of four guns, but the allies, aided by two of H M S Terrible's 4.7 guns, succeeded in silencing the Chinese artillery after eight hours of fighting.

AT SHANGHAI. Shanghai, July 10.-It is difficult to get news here, as the consuls are de-pendent upon Taotai Sheng for Pekin news. He and other officials have large eigners in keeping the peace. officials have turned all their attention to the defense of the Yang Tse, and have guaranteed to protect foreigners at Yang Tse ports, provided the foreigners established there remain No warships are allowed to quiet. land forces, and single warships only are allowed to pass the fortifications. Sheng's proposal to form a Chinese volunteer corps has been rejected.

A WRONG DATE. A Shanghai it seems to be now the general belief that the date of the dispatch of July 3, asserting that two legations were still standing, was an error. The couriers must have left at least five days earlier, making the real date of the message June 28, while the massacres are said to have occurred on June 30. Until this matter is clear-

THE POWERS AGREE. Berlin, July 10 .- The foreign office today informed the Associated Press that all the powers had consented to Japan landing a large force in China, but the stipulation was made before hand that no power could derive any advantage, territorially, from the fact of its having more troops in China than the others. The Japanese Gov-ernment has expressed perfect willingness to send troops under these

The foreign office denied the correctness of the statement by the St. Petersburg Herald that Germany and Russia made a secret agreement last fall for common action in China, adding: The relations between the two governments have hitherto been so friendly and the agreement on China so complete that a treaty has been wholly unnecessary.

Tien Tsin. FOREIGN SETTLEMENT SHELLED

London, July 10 .- A dispatch from

Tien-Tsin, dated Wednesday, July 4,

says: "The Chinese shelled the foreign settlements all day long July 3. Upwards of 150 shells fell into the concession, and many houses were partially wrecked. The casualties, however, were few, the civilians and women and children being ordered to seek shelter in the cellars of the town hall and the Astor Hotel. Three companies of Japanese infantry, a mountain battery and a body of Russians engaged the Chinese artillery, but with little effect. The twelve-pounder of the British first-class cruiser Terrible then came into action, but the enemy placed two shells fairly under the gun, damaging the carriage and wounding the crew. The Chinese in the vicinity of Tien-Tsin have been reinforced during the last forty-eight hours by several thousands of Gen. Mas and Gen. Sung's troops from Pekin. The Chinese also have mounted a number of heavy guns commanding the outposts. A force of Boxers numbering 3,000 men, was seen entering the native city yesterday.

Vice-Admiral Alixiff has arrived here. He is expected to assume command. The allied forces now number about 10,000 men, including eight hundred Japanese, who arrived yesterday. Arrangements are being made to send the women and children to Japan by

way of Taku and Chee-Foo. IMPERIAL TROOPS ENGAGED.

Tien Tsin, Thursday, July 5 .- Yesterday large forces of Chinese troops attacked the settlements from two directions—one from the western arsenal and the other upon the railway station on the opposite bank of the river. The attack from the arsenal was directed upon what is probably the weakest point of defense, which has hitherto not been pressed. The Chinese advanced on this side across an open plain, without cover, and the attack was easily repulsed by the British guns. The enemy made a simultaneous attack upon the station with a large infantry force, covered by the fire of eleven guns. The British replied with two of H. M. S. Terrible's 12-pounders and five smaller guns, while the combined forces of the British, French, Russian and Japanese infantry moved out to deal with the Chinese infantry attacks. The Chinese artillery practice was excellent, and the allied troops suffered severely from a well-directed shell fire. The Japan-ese, whose behavior was splendid, executed a well-conceived movement and succeeded in turning the Chinese left and driving the enemy from their strong position among the irrigation trenches. The Chinese retired to the native city, the allied infantry with-drew, and the affair became an artilduel, lasting until darkness, with little damage to either side. A Brit-ish regiment of Chinamen which was engaged proved very steady under fire.

"LADYSMITH TO TIEN TSIN." A welcome addition to the defense was received yesterday in the shape of two more of H. M. S. Terrible's "twelves." Painted on their carriages is the inscription: "Ladysmith to Tien Tsin, immediate." The Algerine today sent two 4-inch guns, which will do much toward equalizing the artillery strength of the allies with that of the enemy. Most of the women and children left today, and the remainder will follow as opportunity offers. Two thousand Japanese troops landed at Taku today, and 13,000 more are ex-

pected within a few days. A Shanghai dispatch says the chief difficulty of the allied forces at Tien Tsin is the absence of an adequate water supply. The river is pestilential. The condition of the

The panic among the Chinese in the southern provinces is completely stopping trade, and most of the native cotton mills are closed.
