A San Francisco inventor is building a locomotive with the cab in front.

Additions to the Stone ransom fund have practically ceased. The fund aggregates nearly \$6,000.

Peter McCarthy, a pioneer barrister of Calgary, N. B., died at his home on Tuesday after a long illness.

A dangerous gang of thugs seems to be gathering into Toronto for the royal reception. Several highway robberies have been reported.

The bodies of sixteen members of the crew of the lost steamer Hudson, including that of Capt. McDonald, are still to be accounted for.

Wm. Hayden, employed in Still's hand-lace factory, has two fingers cut off yesterday afternoon by a circular saw. Dr. Curtis dressed the hand.

The steamer Santa Anna has arrived at Port Townsend, Wash., from Nome, bringing 95 passengers and \$100,000 in dust belonging to returning miners.

The New York Yacht Club today formally declined Sir Thomas Lipton's proposal to race the Shamrock II again next summer for the America's cup.

Nicholas Wagner, a Detroit dairyman living at 442 Clay avenue, was run over by his own horse Wednesday night about 6 o'clock, and died an hour later.

Special constables have been sworn in at Ottawa to guard the houses where smallpox patients have been discovered, and seven patients are now isolated.

The United States agricultural department estimates the yield of best sugar in United States this year will be 1,250,000 tons, which Michigan will produce 60,000 tons.

A gold find of great richness is reported from Tucson, Ariz., in the Galturo Mountains. The deposit is cut by a creek, it is estimated that \$7,000,000 of ore is actually in sight.

Mr. Justice Britton was sworn in as a judge of the King's bench division before a large gathering of leading counsel and judges, which began yesterday at a largely attended meeting of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Board of Trade of London.

Mining dividends paid in September amounted to \$16,210,645, of which the standard Oil and United States Steel Company disbursed \$13,066,115. Gold, silver and lead dividends increased over August.

There is no foundation for the recently published in the United States that Ambassador Choate was preparing to sail for the United States with his family on Saturday to take a holiday, will not return to London.

Resolutions against the reckless admittance of undeveloped lands to the United States were adopted yesterday at a largely attended meeting of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Board of Trade of London.

President Fowler, of the Puget Sound Bridge and Developing Company, a Seattle corporation, has been notified that his firm has been awarded the government contract, valued at \$2,000,000, for dredging the harbor of Manila and other work.

Sir Frederick Young, K. C. M. G., a passenger on the Oceanic, will attend the laying of the corner stone for an extension to the Kingston University at Kingston, Ont., Oct. 15, and be present at the reception to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York.
