Lord Roberts Says the Government Is Making Every Effort to End the Boer War--- Enemy in Cape Colony.

London, Oct. 10 .- Earl Roberts, comnander-in-chief of his majesty's forces, conferred medals at Liverpool on Tuesday upon soldiers who had returned from South Africa. In the course of an address to the troops he referred to the newspaper outcry against the proongation of the war. He assured his hearers that every effort was being made by the generals in South Africa, the war office and the government to hasten the end. Gen. Kitchener, in whom he had explicit confidence, had not made a single demand which had

not been complied with immediately. This would be continued. Earl Roberts in conclusion declared that the anxiety was without cause, and he appealed to the nation to have

THE WEEK'S RESULTS. London, Oct. 9-In his weekly report to the war office, dated Pretoria, yesterday, Lord Kitchener says that since his last report, 50 Boers have been killed. 26 wounded, 244 taken prisoners, and there have been 60 surrenders. Lord Kitchener adds: "Gen. (F. W.) Kitchener was engaged on Sunday, near Vryheid, with the enemy who were trying to move north. Gen. Bruce Hamilton was also engaged. The re-sults of these fights have not been re-

ENEMY IN CAPE COLONY. Lord Kitchener locates five Boer mandos in Cape Colony. These, he says, are being pursued by the British columns, and are engaged al-

most daily. MARTIAL LAW. Cape Town, Oct. 9.-The Gazette proclaims martial law in the districts of Cape Town, Wynberg, Simonstown, Port Elizabeth and East London. The proclamation is the outcome of the re-cent visit of the premier of Cape Colony, Sir John Gordon Sprigg, and the under secretary of native affairs in South Africa, J. Rose Innes, to the British high commissioner, Lord Mil-
