DISASTER TO RACING TRAIN

Derailed While Going 65 Miles an Hour.

Four Persons Killed and Twenty-Three Injured-Well-Known Musician Killed.

Keokuk, Ia., April 30. - The California limited, on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe road, east bound was derailed on a curve at Cama, switch, five miles west of Medill, Mo. yesterday, while going at tremendous speed. Four persons were killed and

The conductor went on to a farm house and telephoned a report of the wreck. The railroad officials then hurried a relief train from Fort Madison.

SEIZED AN ISLAND IN THE ST. LAWRENCE

Canadian Contractors Put Armed Pickets in

Charge of Float Island. Ogdensburg, N. Y., May 1.—Canadian ontractors who are in disoute as to who has the contract for building the summer school on Float Island, in the St. Lawrence River, have seized the island and placed an armed picket
