

When the agreement was sent to City Solicitor Meredith, he informed the board that they could not make any such agreement, as the question was covered by the school act, and by that law the county must pay 80 per cent.

Marconi's Splendid Offer. Signor Marconi thought it would be injudicious for governments to enter into a scheme for state-owned cables without first investigating the merits of wireless communication. The cost of equipping two stations for communication over a distance already tested of 3,000 miles, would be £100,-600. The speed transmission at present is 25 words a minute, but by duplexing he hoped to make it fifty (applause) if service increased. His company would be prepared to reduce the cost of press messages to twopence a

word (applause). Messrs. Kiffin, Thomas, and Cunningham opposed the resolution, and Mr. Fink supported it, pointing out the danger of cable companies also gaining a monopoly of wireless.

Intolerable Discrimination. Mr. J. S. Brierly, of Montreal, said this was very largely a Canadian question. The reduction announced by the Pacific board was the strongest argument in favor of Ross' resolution. They could not look for a reduction across the Atlantic under present circumstances. They should not pay exaggerated respect to the question of competition with companies. (Hear! hear!)
