

ALLEGED GIRL-SLAYER KEPT ON THE RACK

New York Police Pressing Hard to Secure a Full Confession From Wolter.

[By Associated Press.]

New York, March 29 .- Although Albert Wolter, the youth accused of trapping Ruth Wheeler in his rooms and then strangling her and burning her to death. begged the detectives to give him until Wednesday, when, he declared, "I will tell you the whole truth," there was small indication today that his accussers meant to let up for a moment in their pressure for confession. Wolter passed Tombs. He seemed to realize to the full for the first time the seriousness of his position. Shrinking even from mention of the tragedy and covering his face with his hands and sobbing at reiteration of the pitiful tale of the girl sten-ographer, who had met such an appat-ling fate shortly after applying to him for a position, the trembling lad clung to the comfort contained in a reassuring message which came to him from his companion, Katie Miller. It was plain that Wolter hoped today for a further assurance that the Miller woman stood by him. And whatever was loyal in the youth was aroused by the peril to which it was pointed to him his woman friend silence. The police declared their fidence that they have a complete cumstantial chain woven about Wolter. 
