AN INDUSTRIAL WAR

German Firms and Employees Lived Up For Bitter Struggle.

Berlin, April 17. — The building trades lock-out, which has made quarter of a million workmen idle, appears to be the beginning of a long struggle, affecting many divisions of the national industry. The employers have locked out the men in an effort to put an end, once and for all, to what they regard as the intolerable demands of the latter.

The employers declare that the workmen have been pursuing for several years a policy of forcing higher wages and shorter hours by bringing about local strikes in various cities, thus securing occasional advantages, which they would be unable to obtain through concerted action. They also say that the time has come when employers must stand together to hold Wortley Road, London, Ontario.
