

For several days nothing had been seen of Gebhardt, and today when no smoke was seen coming from the chimney, and no footmarks could be found in the snow, people who live around thought they had better see if he were ill. On opening the door of the house the old man was found lying on the floor, where he had apparently fallen while on his way into the house. A physician who was called stated that Gebhardt had been dead for several days. The remains were taken to Tillsonburg for interment. No inquest will be held. Gebhardt was unmar

Spectacular Blaze.

The blaze was a most spectacular one the flames shooting hundreds of feet in the air. The stables are almost directly behind the seven-story Darch building or Talbot street, and the flames shot many feet above the building. It appeared for a time as if the whole block would go There are many stabiles and frame buildings in that locality, and it was considered impossible to prevent the flames spreading.

When the firemen arrived four horses had been taken out, the flames at that time being confined to the loft. The men were informed that all the horses were out, but when Chief Aitken and his men got into the building they bumped into a horse standing in the passageway. The firemen led him out, sufsee no others, but, hearing a whinny, they took out a second one. Another horse City Hotel and other places were endangered but the excellent work of the

firemen worked until after 10 o'clock before the fire was finally subdued. A Peculiar Feature.
A peculiar feature of the fire was the destruction of the horses belonging to Mr. Thomas S. Lawrason. He owns a

stable close to those of the Windsor House. During the first fire that stable flames were playing about it, and once or twice it caught. Four horses were an hour's time they were in a worse fire than they had left. It seemed as if fate was pursuing them.

"Our own stables, as it turned out, were not badly damaged, 'said Mr. Lawrason to The Advertiser. "It looked as if they would be destroyed, and our horses were taken to the Harrison House stables. Instead of taking them away from the fire we took them right into it. One horse is dead. One of the others will certainly have to be destroyed, and I am afraid the third will be of little use. They were good horses, valued at \$600. One I refused \$300 for. I do not think any person had any grudge against me. Somebody

must have wanted to destroy hotel stables." A Firebug Blamed.
