SUFFRAGISTS REFUSE TO ENTER INTO BONDS

Women and Men May Be Imprisoned For Six Months.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 25.—Five prominent suffragists were charged before the police magistrate at Bow Street today with obstructing the police during last night's demonstration in Parliament Square, when they protested violently against Premier Asquith, who had refused to see them.

The prisoners were Laurence Housman, author and artist; Henry W. Nevins, war correspondent; Mrs. D. A. Thomas, wife of the Welsh coal magnate; H. D. Harben and Miss K. Haig. The magistrate ordered them all to be bound over in a bond of \$25 each to be of good behavior for six months. The prisoners all refused to enter into the bond.

In the ordinary course, offenders refusing to be bound over remain in prison for six months.

ONE HUNDRED AUTOS DESTROYED IN FIRE

Employee of Factory Missing, and Dozen Firemen Injured.

[Canadian Press.] Lynn, Mass., Feb. 25.—Nearly 100 automobiles were lost in a fire which destroyed the Essex Garage, a three-story brick building on Broad street, today, causing a loss of \$275,000. Stephen Athus, an employee, is missing. Two firemen were seriously hurt when the second floor fell, and ten others were injured in a hot-air explosion. The cause of the fire is not known. Athus was last seen on the third floor. The loss on the automobiles was estimated at \$200,000.

FOUND FROZEN TO DEATH IN A MONTREAL NOVEL

Joseph Lebel Drinks Himself Into a Slumber From Which He Never Awakes

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Feb. 25.—Frozen stiff, the body of Joseph Lebel, 55 years old, was found last night by Lieut. Trudeau and Constable Morrette on the floor of a hotel in the rear of Beaudry street. On a table beside which the body lay was a bottle half-filled with whiskey.

Lebel, together with an old woman named Lacoste, had occupied the place for a long time, but the old woman, who was found by some of the neighbors to be ill, was sent to the Notre Dame Hospital a couple of weeks ago. The police say she was but a few days in the hospital when she died.

Since the old woman was taken to the hospital, Lebel had lived alone. He had evidently drunk himself into a slumber and had been frozen when he was found.

BRIDE SHOT DEAD BY FORMER SWEETHEART

[Canadian Press.] San Francisco, Feb. 25.—Disappointed in love, Abraham Pepper, of Tacoma, Washington, called Mrs. Dorothy Johnson, his former sweetheart, who married F. L. Johnson, of Tacoma, one week ago, to the door of a room in the hotel here where she was spending her honeymoon, shot her dead and then shot himself.

BRINGS BIG CARGO OF ANIMALS AND BIRDS

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 25.—From Hamburg, the world's greatest animal market, the steamer President Lincoln brought today one of the largest cargoes of birds and quadrupeds that ever reached New York. There were 5,000 canaries, 6,000 pheasants, and a large variety of assorted birds, six elephants, ten panthers, nine tigers, and a few porcupines and monkeys.

MAYOR IS CANDIDATE

HAVE LOOSE VIEWS ON RELIGIOUS TEACHING

Hon. S. H. Blake Speaks His Mind About University Professors and Teachers.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, Feb. 25.—The proposal to introduce religious instruction in the public schools, which has precipitated a heated controversy all over the province, has aroused Hon. S. H. Blake. In an interview this morning he expressed himself in his usual vigorous style.

"Seventy years ago in Upper Canada College, the Bible was used as a textbook," remarked Hon. S. H. Blake, in speaking on the proposal to introduce the study of the Bible into the schools of Ontario.

"In the classes," he continued, "it was read verse about by the scholars. If the Roman Catholics desired it, they were at liberty to use their own Douay edition of the sacred volume. It was made the subject of examination, and rewards were given for Scripture learning. The true incentive to the study of the Book was thus given to each pupil in the college."

In a letter to Dr. John Seath, Mr. Blake agrees that the department of education would not be justified in introducing the exposition of the Scriptures to the teachers of our schools. He states that the teachers are influenced by "the loose views of university professors and teachers," and adds: "How can you expect a godly reverence on the part of our students or the teachers in our schools when one of its professors publicly reads at a dinner given to one of his fellows a song from which the following is taken: 'Then follow four verses of a song in which Methusalem and Melchizedek are introduced for purposes of comparison with the guests of the evening, and the last line is 'Corks poppin', champagne fizzin'.'"

HOW BOTHWELL PASTOR OBTAINED NEW MANSE

Got Members To Pay for It in Three Years—Is Asked To Stay.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Bothwell, Feb. 24.—At the quarterly board of the Methodist Church, held recently here, the pastor, Rev. R. J. Currie, was given a unanimous call to return for a fourth year. Rev. Mr. Currie's three-year term here has been rather strenuous, but successful.

On his arrival here the church home was in a sadly dilapidated condition, and rather than fix it up, Mr. Currie suggested buying a fine residence adjoining the church property, promising to remain until it was paid for, which, he said, could be done in three annual payments given by the members, the last payment coming due in November last. These obligations have been met by the members with but few exceptions, and the new parsonage is nearly paid for.

The church also has a new furnace, due to the efforts of Mr. Currie, and the finances of the church are in a prosperous condition.

Spiritually as well as financially Rev. Currie has done his duty, holding special meetings twice at his outside appointment, Armstrong, and once in the church here, and a goodly number were added to the church roll.

"WET AND DRY" CONTEST BRINGS OUT WOMEN

Majority of Places, However, Few Took Advantage of Suffrage.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, Feb. 25.—Comparatively few women yesterday took advantage of their first opportunity to vote under the provisions of the new state suffrage law. Returns tabulated here today indicated that more than two-thirds of the registered women remained away from the primary elections held in many cities and towns of the state.

In Chicago the total number of women who voted was 47,529, or about 30 per cent of the 158,524, who had qualified. The heaviest woman's vote in the state was at Galesburg, the scene of a "wet and dry" contest, where the women cast nearly one-half of the total vote.

SINGLE TAX LEADER. [Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 25.—John Sherwin Crosby, prominent as a single tax leader, died of a complication of diseases yesterday at his home in this city. He was 72 years old.

AMERICAN FISHERMEN ASK BETTER CONDITIONS

[Canadian Press.] Gloucester, Mass., Feb. 25.—Better conditions for American fishermen in Canadian and Newfoundland waters will be sought by a delegation of Gloucester fishing captains and businessmen at a conference with Secretary Bryan at Washington tomorrow. The detailing of a revenue cutter to the fishing grounds to act as a hospital ship also will be suggested.

MORE RAILWAY AID

British Columbia Legislature Has Bill to Guarantee Bonds. [Canadian Press.] Victoria, B. C., Feb. 25.—In the Legislature last night Premier McBride introduced a bill to further aid the P. G. & E. Railway, the most important provision of which was a guarantee of the bonds of that company for the extension of the road from Fort George to a point in the province inside the eastern boundary, a distance of 330 miles, at \$35,000 per mile.

COMMITTED SUICIDE

[Canadian Press.] Newark, N. J., Feb. 25.—Hayward A. Harvey, 45 years old, formerly state assemblyman, committed suicide in the Lackawanna Railroad station at Orange early today by shooting himself through the heart with a revolver. The deed was attributed to temporary insanity, resulting from ill health.

FORMER GOVERNOR DEAD

[Canadian Press.] Portland, Me., Feb. 24.—Major General Joshua L. Chamberlain, surveyor of customs here since 1900, died today. He was born in 1828, and distinguished himself in the Civil War. At the close of the war he was elected governor, and at the end of this service in 1871 became president of Bowdoin College. His home was in Brunswick.

TURNBURY FARMER LOST VALUABLE HORSE

Broke Its Leg and Had To Be Killed—Still Putting Gravel in the Turnbury Hole.

Bridge Construction, Field Telegraphy and Other Work Being Taught by Experts.

Great interest is attached to the school of instruction now being conducted at the armories in connection with the Seventh Field Company of Canadian Engineers. Capt. Kilbourne, of the permanent staff at Ottawa, is giving the lectures and his addresses are illustrated with lantern slides and many practical exhibitions of the work accomplished by the engineering department of the Canadian militia.

Methods of constructing bridges, field telegraphy and other details of the work are being shown in the lectures which are held on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings of each week, and the instruction given is of a most practical and instructive nature.

The local company has an enrollment at the present time of 80 men, and the officers in charge are Major F. W. Fennell, Captain E. Y. Buchanan and Lieutenants Archer, Garratt and Healy. The officers are desirous of increasing the strength of the corps and are ready to receive applications from recruits at any of the evening sessions. Men of a mechanical turn of mind are wanted, as the work done by this branch of this service is of a distinctly mechanical nature.

STICKS TO CONTENTION OF NO FIRE ESCAPES

Despite Government Official's Report, Building Inspector Says City Hall Has Enough.

Building Inspector A. M. Piper sticks to his contention that the temporary city hall is plentifully supplied with toilet accommodations and fire exits, despite the warning of Factory Inspector Harry A. Clark and Chief Inspector J. T. Burke, that the improvements demanded must be made.

The controllers have asked Inspector Piper for another report on the building, but it is likely that the document will be in line with the previous one handed in, viz., that the building is safe, and that the toilet arrangements are quite satisfactory and in conformity with the requirements of the law.

QUEBEC GOVT. KILLS MONTREAL FAIR BILL

TAX TO PROVIDE WAR FUND

Huerta Making Capital From Moving of the Crop.

[Canadian Press.] Mexico City, Feb. 24.—An export tax on coffee, which will provide President Huerta with considerable amount of money for the prosecution of the war, is announced in a decree issued today. The tax amounts to three pesos per 100 kilograms (220 pounds), on unshelled coffee, and three and a half pesos on the cleaned product. The tax becomes effective February 25. The coffee crop is now moving.

MOTHER FINDS FENIAN RAID VETERAN DEAD

Woodstock, Feb. 24.—Oliver Brown, the veteran West Oxford mailcarrier, was found dead in bed at his home yesterday by his mother, who is 91 years old. Mr. Oliver had only retired from the mail-carrying recently and when in Ingersoll a few days ago caught cold and pneumonia developed. Death apparently came very unexpectedly from an attack of heart weakness and he was stricken as he was about to get up. Mr. Oliver was 65 years old and a Fenian Raid veteran. At one time he was a member of the West Oxford Township council. He was unmarried. The funeral will be held on Thursday.
