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## 1ST HUSSARS HOLD BIG CHURCH PARADE

250 Members of Regiment Hear Sermon by Dean L. N. Tucker.

Two hundred and fifty members of the 1st Hussars, under command of Col. C. H. Russell, paraded in St. Paul's Cathedral on Sunday morning. Major Hilliard was second in command. During the service the regimental band, under the leadership of Landmaster Roselle Pocock, played "The Wedding of the Rose."

Dean L. N. Tucker told the soldiers that we are living in a new era of democracy. What existed before the war was made manifest by the war, he declared. "Canada had become a nation. She had fixed her name as a nation to the League of Nations. Autocracy had been swept away. Countries that had been ruled by tyrants for years were now experiencing democracy. In some countries, like India and China, where there were millions of ignorant people, was a risky matter to introduce democracy, but the dean felt sure that they would in time govern themselves in a sane way. He expected that out of the Bolshevik tyranny in Russia would come a sane democracy."

The speaker declared that the hearts of the people go out to those who are working for the reduction of armaments. He praised the League of Nations, because it was a league of 40 nations working together for the good of the world, some of its aims being to abolish the white slave traffic, to end the world over, to create a better understanding between labor and capital, and to eliminate the possibilities of war. He urged the congregation to live lives in their own communities that would recommend our democracy to the world. He urged the soldiers to lead clean and honest lives.

## OFFICE OF DEPUTY POSTMASTER NOT YET DECLARED VACANT

Although Some Londoners Are Said To Be Keeping "Wires Hot."

Although, as Deputy Postmaster Dundas points out, certain "wires hot" between the city and Ottawa over the question as to who shall succeed him on July 1, when he takes over the duties of the postmaster Peter Macdonald, an interesting disclosure was made today on the subject.

A member of the Postal Employees' Association has been notified by the department at Ottawa that while folks in London were boasting three or four different parties for the office and, according to reports, well high had some person appointed to the position of deputy postmaster, the fact is that the department has not yet officially declared vacant. When such has been declared, a notice for application for the same will be forwarded. Until then, it is declared there will be no move toward any appointment.

## ENTERS SUIT AGAINST THE CITY GAS CO.

Id. Wenige Plaintiff in Case Before Davison Court.

Acting for Ald. George A. Wenige of this city, Donohue and McDonald, solicitors have entered a suit in the ninth division court here, against the City Gas Company for return of the gas charges in force here a few months ago. The suit is technically for a breach of the company's statutory declaration for excess in its legal rights.

The papers were served on R. W. Kidner, secretary of the City Gas Company, and no defence has been offered as yet.

The case will be heard in the ninth division court on July 27. This suit was entered Saturday, and if the company loses the case, authorities state that it will be compelled to refund service charges exacted from all gas consumers over a period of months in this city.

## 22ND REGIMENT HELD IN RESERVE IN CASE OF NEED

Quebec, June 27.—No serious trouble was reported in this city last night, where a strike of the policemen and firemen for higher wages is in progress. This morning the 22nd regiment was being held in readiness to quell any disturbance.

The civic authorities are attempting to get men to fill the strikers' places. Today was a public holiday in Quebec, owing to the presence of the French mission, headed by Marshal Fayolle. The streets were crowded this morning by citizens anxious to welcome the mission.

## BUILDERS STILL "AT ODDS."

Ottawa, June 25.—Canadian Press.—The building trades dispute has not yet been settled. The bricklayers are agreeing upon the rate of 90 cents an hour, are still at odds with the contractors on a clause of the agreement providing that preference will be given to union men "all things being equal."

The contractors insist upon the retention of the clause, while the bricklayers insist upon its being dropped.

The church parade in which over 400 London and district Orangemen took part Sunday afternoon was almost disrupted at Dundas and Rectory streets, and the responsibility rests upon a large bulldog owned by a resident of the vicinity. The trouble started when Mr. Bullock, an interested spectator of the parade, returning from the Centennial Methodist Church, became too interested in the activities of a member of the dog's band.

## CITIZENS DRINK 6,300,000 GALS. WATER DAILY

Warm Weather Keeps Home Tap Flowing.

Londoners during the present warm spell consume approximately 6,300,000 gallons of drinking water daily, according to E. V. Buchanan, general manager of the public utilities commission. At least his records show that this amount is drawn from the city water supply daily.

However, with both reservoirs at Springbank holding a total 15,500,000 gallons this morning, and pumps which furnish over 7,000,000 gallons of water daily, there is no danger of a water shortage.

Both reservoirs gained nine inches in depth over the week end, the water now registering nine inches from the top of each.

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## MILK PRODUCERS IN FAVOR OF STARTING CO-OPERATIVE DAIRY

Matter Discussed At Meeting Held Saturday Night.

That the milk producers of the London district should establish a farmers' co-operative dairy of their own in the city has been their ambition for a long time past. How to dispose of advantageously and instantly to the benefit of the city's consumers, their surplus milk has been a problem for the farmers that has increased in seriousness in the past few months.

The question was further discussed Saturday evening by members of the executive of the London District Milk Producers' Association, and although nothing transpired in the way of immediate definite action, it was felt generally that the proposition was certainly worthy of further consideration.

The idea should not be discarded entirely, said the Ontario Department of Agriculture has already expressed itself unable at this time to assist financially, the milk producers feel that the necessary capital could be raised by a sufficient number of farmers can be interested.

The gain to be derived by a co-operative dairy is two-fold, the producers point out. By maintaining a central receiving and distributing depot in the city they would be able to avert to supply any number of citizens with the best quality of milk at the best possible price to the consumer and at the same time, eliminating the middleman, they assert would follow, thereby cutting the present price considerably.

"People of the city do not realize," a member of the executive asserted, "that the distributor is the one responsible for keeping the price where it is today. Even after the recent drop in milk the price was not realized. He did not bear the burden of the cut. In fact his profit was even greater than previously."

The producers feel the need for action is near future. They say. They must provide themselves against the time when the demand for their surplus milk and cream will not be as it is at the present, while the ice cream season is at its best.

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
