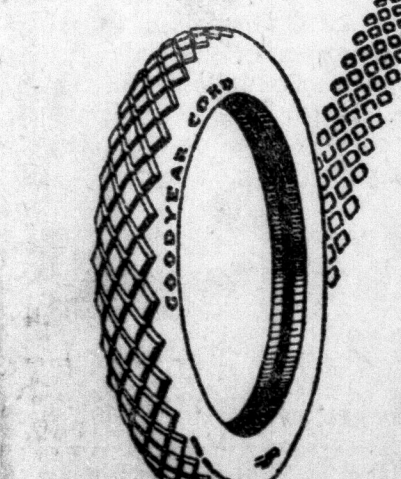

WORKERS GREET COL. GARTSHORE ON RETURN HOME

More Than One Thousand McClary Employees Welcome Firm President.

PRESENT ADDRESS
Company Head Foresees Good Trade Prospects In Orient.

Last night the McClary family was reunited when Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartshore, president of the company, came "home."
Last night London opened her arms to receive again one of her most popular sons. Last night in the glow of the crimson flares, surrounded by a sea of friendly faces, and gladly answering to the welcome of the crowds lining the street, Colonel Gartshore entered into his own.

Six months ago, feeling the strain of nearly 50 years of factory management, he left for a trip through the Orient, and down to the lands of the Southern Cross. Last night in his speech of thanks to those who had assembled to assure him of their affection, he declared that such a holiday as this was only a prelude to the joy of being back again.

The president was met at the Canadian National station by the officials of the company. After greeting many old friends in the depot, he entered his car and proceeded by the Ontario, and down to the lands of the Southern Cross. York street was lined with employees of the company, most of them carrying crimson flares which lit the scene with a soft glow, and above which the clean-cut white letters that spelled "welcome" on the bridge over the street stood out in clear relief.

The big dining-room had been cleared and at one side the band formed, and it was with memory stirred by "Home, Sweet Home" that the colonel made his way through the crowd to the platform.

Reads Address.
Here an address of welcome was read by F. H. Westbury and a beautiful illuminated address presented by John Walton, superintendent of the factory. This address, which is the expression of affection on the part of the various members of the "family," bears 1,170 signatures, and is inscribed on vellum and richly bound.

In the address of welcome, Mr. Westbury said:
"We were glad to wish you God-speed a few months ago, because we knew how much you deserved a real holiday and for how long you have desired to make such a journey."

"You are the head of that family, a big, understanding, open-hearted father who has known most of us for five, ten, twenty, thirty or even forty years, who has been with us in joy and sorrow, as though the welfare of each were that of a son or daughter."

"When you left us you said the happiest moment of all would be when you turned your steps homeward once more."

"And our happiest moment since you left us comes with your return tonight. You are back in your own home city, in the bosom of your family, and your own flock takes possession of you once more—for keeps."

"Please accept from each and all, your big McClary's family, this expression of our warmest thoughts and affection on your safe return and restoration to us. Welcome home, colonel!"

Thanks Donors.
In a brief reply Colonel Gartshore thanked the members of the organization who had given so generously of their kindness to make his return a happy one. He promised at another time to talk to them of the trip itself, of the wonders of the Orient and of the trade possibilities on the other side of the Pacific.

"Tonight," he said, "I just want to thank you for all that you have done, to tell you how glad I am to be home once more, and to express the thanks of my wife and all my party for the homecoming you have given us."

"For 47 years," the Colonel continued, "I worked here, as one of the family. During the last two or three years the greatest trouble I had to face was the problem of keeping the family together, and of giving all you men work, and your families a home. Of the future I have a vision of better times, not all at once, but through a steady increase in trade and opportunity. There is, I think, a great market for us in the Orient and in the Antilles, which will help to keep us busy."

The president spoke of the darker side of the bright clouds that had attended his return to the old city. The death of his old friend, Frank Leonard, who had come to bid him good-bye when he left for his trip, and the death of one of his men in the factory a few days ago.

Regrets Employee's Death.
"This last," he said, "casts a tinge of sorrow over my welcome. It is one of those things that do happen in a factory no matter how careful we are. I cannot express how deeply this sad accident, which breaks the circle of the McClary family, touches me."

"Another time I can talk better, tonight I can only thank you from the depths of my heart. I thank you all."

As Colonel Gartshore finished his speech the song, "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow," in which the band drowned his voice, was sung. The crowd, which had gathered in the crowded hall, echoed and reechoed, reaching the people in the street, and sounding on the quiet summer-like air with perfect clearness.

For ten minutes the colonel knew what the Prince of Wales had to go through in the way of shaking hands. Everyone in the building lined up to greet the greatest of all Anglo-Saxon signs that the flares and bands were really imbued with the spirit of welcome and love.

Social Service Body Asks Limitation of Marriages

Urge Legislation Requiring Presentation of Certificates of Mental and Physical Fitness Before Licenses Are Issued.

London's social service council in session at the Y. M. C. A. last night resolved to urge legislation for the punishment of wife deserters and for the care of their families, but left the question of segregation of mental defectives, unfit to assume the responsibility of parenthood, to a special committee.

The resolution regarding wife desertion read:
"That in view of the large number of cases of family desertion, and the misery produced thereby, coming to the notice of this council, and the conviction we have that what is true of this community is likely to be true of other communities in our province and dominion."

Detain Deserters.
"We would very respectfully urge upon the Social Service Council of Ontario and of Canada the extreme desirability of pressing for legislation calculated to relieve the distress of deserted wives and families, even to the point of legal detention of deserters and the appropriation of their earnings to the support of their wives and families."

When the amendment to this amendment to the motion was passed, the following committee was selected by the chairman to frame a resolution and bring it in at the next meeting of the council: Mrs. A. C. Joseph, Mrs. Rose, Rev. John Garbutt, Rev. M. Kelly and Rev. W. Leslie Armitage.

This motion inspired the following resolution:
"That in view of the evils that follow the marriage of persons physically and mentally unfit, we urge upon the Social Service Council of Ontario the importance of legislation being passed compelling all persons applying for marriage licenses to furnish a certificate as to their mental and physical fitness."

Detroit, May 4.—Fred Sanger, defendant in a contested divorce suit being heard in Circuit Court before Judge Theodore J. Richter, was an original if not a successful lover, Mrs. Catharine Marx, a neighbor of the Sangers in Wyandotte, testified.

Testifying for Mrs. J. Catharine Sanger, who is seeking the divorce, Mrs. Marx said that Sanger, hard put to get a way to get a love letter to her, deposited it in the tin spaces of a chicken which Mrs. Sanger had cleaned for Mrs. Marx.

The note was duly delivered and read, according to Mrs. Marx: "Our eyes have met."

"But oh, you marry widow," "You and I shall be married yet," Mrs. Marx testified also that Sanger, as a result of the divorce, waited in front of her house, to walk to church with her. This, she said, was distasteful to her, but she did not want to hurt his feelings by telling him so.

The case was continued.

PASS BILL TO LIMIT IMPORTS OF LIQUOR

Exporters Are Barred Under New Act From Shipping To Wet Provinces.

Ottawa, May 3.—Third reading was given in the House of Commons today of a bill to limit the importation of liquor into the wet provinces of Quebec and British Columbia, but with an important amendment.

"Of course," the amendment provided that liquor could be imported into such provinces only by the provincial authorities, manufacturers and exporters. As amended by a government member, exporters were excluded and apart from the provincial commission, only distillers and manufacturers are allowed to export liquor into the wet provinces.

"Hon. members," said Sir Lomer Gouin, minister of justice, referring to comments on British Columbia, "are very much opposed, and rightly so, to the bootlegging that is carried on in that province. My hon. friends object to license to exporters. Well, I am prepared to drop that."

The amendment submitted yesterday by W. G. McQuarrie of New Westminster, to provide for a plebiscite was defeated. George Black of the Yukon declared that the fight against bootlegging in British Columbia was a "sham fight."

REPORT TELLS STORY OF HOPPE COAL LANDS

Inquiry Throws Light On Alberta Property Worth Millions.

Ottawa, May 3.—Another chapter in the tangled history of the Hoppe Coal Lands of Alberta, said to be worth a hundred millions, is written in the report of a special committee of the Senate tabled by Senator Beique, chairman, this afternoon.

The report briefly tells the story of the famous coal leases from the year 1912 when they were granted to D. P. R. Isenberg; it tells among other things of the previous investigation by a Senate committee which in 1919 held an inquiry under the chairmanship of Senator Bradbury; of the cancellation of the leases by the dominion government during the war on the ground of non-payment of rent; of the death of Isenberg; of the filing of a petition of right by his executors, the Hawaiian Trust Company and Bertha Isenberg and of the issue of a flat last October to enable the executors to take action in the exchequer court to have the leases declared still valid and existing.

It was the issue of the flat which led to the present further inquiry; and a feature of the committee's proceedings was production of an agreement between the executors of the Isenberg estate and William Murdoch of Ottawa under which all rights in the leases are transferred to the latter.

ARRIVES IN FLOODED AREA
WITH 90 SACKS OF MAIL

Fredericton, N. B., May 4.—Complete isolation with the outside world, in the matter of mail and traffic services was broken here Wednesday night when the arrival of the steamer J. H. Purdy from St. John, which brought a consignment of 90 sacks of mail. The first incoming mail since Saturday was received shortly before the arrival of the Purdy by motorboat from Margerville.

DIRECTS WINDING UP STEEL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Toronto, May 4.—An order by Mr. Justice Fisher yesterday directed that the Steel Realty and Development Corporation, Limited, be liquidated under the winding up act instead of under bankruptcy proceedings. It is declared that as the assets of the company extend from coast to coast the winding up can be conducted more expeditiously under the winding up than in the bankruptcy court.

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OFFICIALS ABSENT; PAYLIST BATTLE STILL UNDECIDED

Vining and Wenige Stage One-Round Verbal Battle.

QUESTIONS WORDING
Chairman Claims Application Should Read "Council," Not "Mayor."

Like the premature declaration of peace, yesterday's prediction that the battle for the paylists was drawing to a close, proved to be a rumor with little foundation.

The final "show-down" with the public utilities commission is now slated for the "first favorable opportunity." The majority of the commissioners were out of the city yesterday afternoon, Jared Vining and Mayor Wenige alone appearing.

While no definite action could be undertaken they debated clauses in the waterworks act of 1875, both agreeing to disagree until a special session could be called.

"I thought this pay list question had been disposed of," commented Commissioner Vining by way of a preliminary.

"As it was up before it was disposed of," explained the mayor.

"What do you propose to do now, Mr. Mayor?" questioned the chairman.

"I haven't decided yet," elucidated his worship.

The famous extract of the act was then dissected clause by clause, the chairman maintaining that if technicalities were to be observed the application for the lists was not due in proper language. It should read "council" and not "mayor."

"Any alderman or person duly appointed will do," objected the mayor.

"They are always available to the auditor," reminded Secretary Ellwood.

Mayor Wenige protested that there had been refusals—once when papers that were to be examined by him were removed from the city clerk's desk and secondly when access to the paylists were denied after arrangements had been made for the city hall clerks to come into the utilities department and make a copy of them.

"We may as well clear up this phase of the question now," declared Commissioner Vining. "In my opinion, if there was any mistake at all it was in allowing our records to leave our office. Officials should not permit such action."

"I am sorry that the other commissioners are not present. I want to get rid of this question."

"So do I," interjected the mayor. "It has claimed altogether too much attention from men in public places," continued the chairman, "more than its importance justifies. You know the views of my colleagues, but when they return I will get in touch with them and we'll conclude this affair."

"It is my personal opinion, however, that Manager Buchanan was entirely justified when he removed our records from the clerk's office."

Discuss Removal.
"The act doesn't say that these records are not to be removed from your department," suggested Mayor Wenige.

"And it doesn't say that you can," countered Commissioner Vining. "And as far as the auditor is concerned, he is also our auditor when he is auditing our accounts. We should be quite within our rights if we directed him not to remove any papers from our office."

Well, the act says 'council' and not 'the mayor,' again objected the chairman.

"Well, I could call a special session of the council and remove those technicalities," assured the mayor.
