GERMAN ELECTION SUNDAY ATTRACTS WORLD INTEREST

75 Parties Are Represented in 23 Factions on Official Ballot.

RESULTS TUESDAY

Associated Press Despatch. Berlin, May 2.—The German nationalists at their campaign for the general election tomorrow are making a determined eleven-hour attack on the Socialists for precipitating the revolution of November 1918. They threaten parliamentary investigation and punishment of the "red traitors" whom they charge with "stabbing the army in the back" and staging the revolution through-out Germany with the aid of Russian rubles. A score of old army leaders, among them General Von Hutler and General Von Kossch, are broadcasting an appeal to their former comrades urging them to work for the nationalist ticket which demands renunciation of the Treaty of Versailles as well as other "humiliating and degrading demands from our former foes."

While the German Chauvinists are hewing close to their familiar political demands in the fight for votes, the middle parties—comprising the Socialists, clericals, people's party and Democrats—are carrying out a "gentlemen's agreement" whereby they are tacitly abstaining from attacking one another in the course of their campaign, centering the election issue on the adoption and execution of the experts' report in which they have secured the outspoken and decisive support of the German industrial interests. The present campaign suggests a political "witches' Sabbath" in that no less than 75 parties are represented in the 23 factions appearing on the official ballot. Unnumbered

local, civic, political, economic and religious organizations have entered the field, thus complicating the official count of the ballots and their distribution on the basis of the proportional system obtaining in Germany.

The federal election commission in all probability will not be in a position to indicate even approximate results before Tuesday as the country is divided into 35 electoral precincts, each of which must take a laborious count of the variegated party ballots. Chancellor Marx, interviewed by Germania, is quoted as declaring that the country's financial and economic situation and restore its currency, as the domestic difficulties could only be solved when the reparation problem was out of the way. The chancellor appealed to the voters to vote for the moderate parties, which he declared were the only ones able to save Germany from the danger of greater misfortunes.

QUAINT OLD-WORLD FOLKS PICTURED IN GLEN WORKS

The Versatile London Artist Exhibits More Than 100 Paintings.

SPRING DISPLAY

Reflection of Raphael Genius Seen in Symbolical Canvas of Mother, Children.

An art exhibition which holds unusual interest for Londoners is being displayed at 399 Richmond street by Edward Glen, the versatile and talented local artist. More than 100 paintings of various themes and diversified treatments have been hung in the building, and citizens may put in an interesting and entertaining hour or more inspecting them.

The spring display of Mr. Glen's work may be seen every day until May 14. Some powerful effects of light and shade have been executed by Mr. Glen and the exhibition embraces every detail of treatment in which the London painter specializes. Pastoral and water scenes abound in the Glen exhibition. The artist spent several years in Normandy and Brittany, and the influence of the sylvan atmosphere and quaint picturesque customs of old-world folk is strikingly apparent in his artistic achievements. Foremost among the pictures is one of a sleeping Spanish boy which is rich in texture and eminently fascinating by reason of sombre color tones employed. The impression of fatigue and languor is here splendidly carried out.

A reflection of Raphael's genius is seen in a decorative picture featuring a symbolical figure of a woman nursing children. Here, too, the deeper colors predominate and a distinctly tranquil and pleasing impression is given. One of the most popular of Mr. Glen's paintings is that of a wounded hero being cared for by one of the enemy. In this Mr. Glen has obviously sought to memorialize the essential humanity of the rough soldier who, stripped of the destructive instinct for the moment, gives expression to the Christlike spirit which is inherent in all men. It is a gripping picture, combining pathos and drama with a high degree of reality.

The smaller paintings breathe the atmosphere of French provincialism. On viewing them, the peasant homes of Jean and Yvette assume a vivid and startling familiarity to those who have toured and delighted in the unspoiled complacency of a land only vaguely touched as yet by the commercialism of 20th century civilization.

These less imposing paintings are little poems in colors which soothe the mind and lend a mild stimulant to the imagination.

REVENTLOW WILL KEEP DOWN WOMEN

Pan-German Leader Declares Female Element Must Not Rule.

Associated Press Despatch. Berlin, May 2.—The state is an institution of men and will remain a manly institution, despite the efforts of modern women to get the upper hand. Count Von Reventlow, Pan-German leader and candidate for the new Reichstag in Schleswig, who is opposing Count Von Bernstorff, declared in a campaign speech today. "German women have had a taste of politics and like it," he declared, "and now have dreams of becoming a dominating power. But we do not want to see them rule Germany and have no idea of permitting them to oust the men as the governors."

Harking back to the war days and the German U boat campaign, Martha Boje, in the Berlin Zeitung Am Mittag, answers the Count and reminds the women voters how a "manly" war brought nothing but misery to Germany. She urges the women to show their power with the ballot.

VALERA, MEXICAN REBEL THINKS COLLEGE MAN

Answers on Students' Exams. Disclose Confused Ideas on Noted Men.

NO CANADIAN CATTLE ON GLASGOW MARKET

Associated Press Despatch. Ottawa, May 3.—In cables received by the department of agriculture, Glasgow, reports no Canadian cattle on offer this week. It is expected that the foot and mouth disease restrictions will be lifted by next week. Medium and prime Scotch sold from 13c to 14c per pound live weight. Heavies 12c to 12½c; Irish, 11½c to 12½c. Birkenhead sold 710 Canadian fat cattle from 20½c to 21½c, sinking off. Eleven hundred Irish made similar prices. Three hundred cattle from South Africa sold from 11½c to 16c, sinking off. Market steady. London reports no Canadian or Irish dressed.

There were 610 cattle billed through Montreal for export to Great Britain during the week.

REPORT KU KLUX KLAN ORGANIZING IN VANCOUVER

It is said that the organizer here comes from a city in the middle western states. The first step toward organizing the Klan is said to be the payment by the candidate of \$10. On the day set the would-be klanman goes to a hotel room, where in the presence of three witnesses he is initiated with all the figures he is initiated with all the weird pomp of the Klan and bound by a terrible oath of loyalty and secrecy.

HUNDREDS APPLY TO SEE LIBRARY

Magnificent Morgan Collection Proving a Nation-Wide Attraction.

New York, May 2.—Hundreds of applications from scholars, research students and the idly curious for permission to visit the magnificent Pierpont Morgan Library in East Thirty-sixth street have deluged the staff since Mr. Morgan on Feb. 15, as a memorial to his father, turned the library and its contents over to a board of trustees for the use in perpetuity of scholars.

The waiting list already is so long that no further applications, no matter how meritorious, can be considered until late summer, according to Miss Belle da Costa Greene, the director. Nearly every section of the nation is represented in the list which is the result of careful elimination of sight-seeing curiosity seekers and of granting of applications to those intent upon serious utilization of the resources offered by the books and manuscripts of the \$7,000,000 collection.

The smallness of the library and the great value of its contents and decorations make it impossible to admit many persons at a time, while general visitors must be barred entirely to save the treasures from possible accidental injury.

SHARP EARTH SHOCK RECORDED AT TORONTO

Tremors Continued For Over Two Hours, Says Dominion Bureau.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, May 2.—A moderate but sharp earthquake was recorded on the seismograph at the Dominion Meteorological Bureau here yesterday afternoon at 2:45 standard time, with the tremors continuing for over two hours. The greatest intensity was recorded between 3:10 and 3:22 p.m., with slight tremors recorded up to 5:20 p.m. It is estimated that the earthquake was 2,170 miles distant, possibly in the West Indies.

ESKIMO LADS SHOW ABILITY AS STUDENTS

U. S. Bureau of Education Schooner Prepares to Sail From Alaska.

Juneau, Alaska, May 2.—The steamer Boxer, of the United States bureau of education, was here recently preparing to go south after her first school of service in a floating industrial school. Throughout the winter the Boxer carried 19 students, Eskimo lads who had distinguished themselves in the seventh and eighth grades of the government schools near their homes.

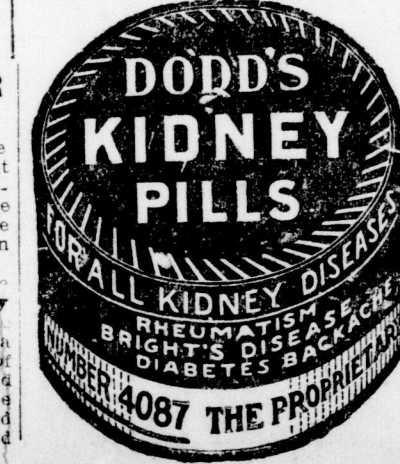
Eight of the students came from the country between Point Barrow and Unalaska, the farthest north of all United States land, and the rest from the Panhandle or southeastern Alaska. The young Eskimos were taught navigation, gas engineering and other subjects. They all proved good students, reported C. W. Hawkesworth, superintendent for the bureau.

BUENOS AIRES PRESIDENT NOW FACING BIG CRISIS

Buenos Aires, May 3.—President Dr. Alvear was faced today with the alternative of postponing application of the new pension law or accepting the consequences of a nation-wide strike. The law provides for the deduction of five per cent from salaries to be applied to a pension fund, the employers contributing a like amount. President Dr. Alvear, while represented as acknowledging the imperfections of the new law, has taken the stand that, as it is on the statute books, he is powerless to alter it and obliged to see that it is enforced.

CRIMINAL JUDGE AGAINST DEATH PENALTY ABOLITION

London, May 3.—Mr. Justice Avory, one of the most experienced of British judges, who specializes in criminal rather than in civil work, told a Yorkshire grand jury yesterday that after 50 years experience he would unhesitatingly assert that abolition of capital punishment would lead to a disastrous increase in crime. Men who held that the extreme penalty had no effect could never have witnessed, much less partaken in a trial for murder.



FIND 3-YEAR-OLD DEAD ON STREET

Police Are Looking For Clue—Believe Lad Was Struck by Car.

Canadian Press Despatch. Guelph, Ont., May 2.—Early this morning the dead body of Angelo Beletti, the 3-year-old son of Angelo Beletti, was found on Alice street, near his home. There is considerable mystery, how the lad came to his death, no person seeing the boy on the streets nor hearing any cry from him.

Medical examination disclosed the fact that the boy's neck was broken, indicating that he must have been struck by a motorcar or other fast-moving vehicle. There were no passersby on the street at that hour, and complete mystery envelops the manner of death. The police are busy upon the case, but have not the slightest clue on which to work. Alice street is a much travelled thoroughfare all day long.

REBEL GENERALS SURRENDER

Associated Press Despatch. Mexico City, May 3.—The surrender of six rebel generals, six colonels, 16 lesser officers and 46 soldiers is reported from Oaxaca, by the federal general Reyes Gil. The rebels have been disarmed and permitted to return to their homes.
