that the main obstacle to a complete agreement lies in the opposition of Sir Kobert Bond, the Newfoundland premier. to the renewal of that paragraph of the modus vivendi of last season, which legalizes the enlistment of Newfoundland fishermen as members of the crews of American fishing smacks.

It is assumed that the premier's objection is based not so much upon the actual employment of these shore fishermen at lucrative wages on American fishing vessels, a matter of pecuniary loss to the colony, but rather from an unwillingness

to admit a modus vivendi, that a colonial law, such as prohibits their employment in this manner, may not invalidate the treaty provision to the contrary.


SUMMON NINE MEN IN WIARTON CASE
