Japanese Writer Describes the Metropolis of the World as He Sees It

LONDON, Aug. 31.—All the bookshelves in London are displaying this week a work by the young Japanese artist, Mr. Yoshio Markino, which has recently come from press. Mr. Yoshio's book is called "The Color of London," and between its covers one can, for the price of 20 shillings, learn, in a most delightful fashion, what sort of an impression this great city, famous the world over as a drab and colorless conglomeration of streets and houses of no particular architectural pretensions, makes upon the sun-soaked eyes of a native of the flowery land on the other side of the world.

Former Agreement Remains in Force. Newfoundland Premier Objects to Fishermen Working in U. S. Smacks.

COLONY INSISTS. ST. JOHN, Nfld., August 31.—The Newfoundland cabinet, at a meeting to-day, decided to insist on right to require each citizen to obtain a license before being employed by a foreign vessel in colonial waters.

WASHINGTON, August 31.—State department advices from London, where Ambassador Reid is conducting directly with the British foreign office, the negotiations looking to the adjustment of the Newfoundland fisheries question, indicate that the main obstacle to a complete agreement lies in the opposition of Sir Robert Bond, the Newfoundland premier, to the renewal of that paragraph of the modus vivendi of last season, which legalizes the enlistment of Newfoundland fishermen as members of the crews of American fishing smacks.

RESCUERS UNABLE TO LOCATE MORE BODIES

Work Still Goes on Before Thousands of Interested and Anxious Onlookers

QUEBEC, August 31.—In speaking of the bridge disaster to-day Hon. S. N. Parent, president of the Quebec Bridge Company, was non-committal, but one of the directors said he would urge the immediate continuance of the work.

Thousands Visit Scene. Thousands of people were at the scene all day to-day while the river was dotted with the bodies of those who perished in the disaster of Thursday, no more have been brought forth and it is generally believed that any more picked up will be found far from the scene of destruction.

At the time of the collapse a passenger train was within a couple of hundred yards of the bridge. From this point the structure was plainly visible and, as usual, the passengers stood up in order to obtain the best view of the mighty structure. They were all looking towards the bridge.
