Yellow Fever in Buenos Ayres.

OVER TWELVE THOUSAND VICTIMS - THE PESTILENCE STILL RAGING.

MONTEVIDEO, April 15th, 1871. The black wings of pestilence are hovering with sombre shadows over our neighboring city of Buenos Ayres, and a population which ten weeks since numbered at least 200,000 souls is now reduced by death and

flight to 40,008. Up to this date there have been over 12,-000 deaths, and the daily average of mortality for the past lew weeks has been

On Saturday last, a week ago to-day, there have been five hundred and one deaths. Seven hundred and forty-nine bodies were counted at the cemetery gates as the mortality bill of Sunday and this as in many other baces, was doubtless short of the actoal number, as it comprised interments

Over 200 fatal cases were reported up to 2 o'clock P M of Monday, the total report for the day belog only five hundred and birty-seven.

Tuesday showed somewhat of a decrease, the day's interments being only three hund. red and pinety seven. On Wednesday up to half-past one o'clock.

three hundred and three burials were regien tered, the motality for the day reaching four hundred and twenty-seven. A new cemetery, to recieve the fever piotims, has been opened in the campo south of

the city toward the Riashuela-the old pagtheon being inadequate. A tram railroad has also been laid from the city to this new pecropolis, and the bodies are carried out on the trucks like so much packed freight. There is no time to construct offine or buried cases. The stock on hand was long since exhausted, and the undertakers have in some instances fled from the terrible harvest of business that bas sprung up.

About 150,000 persons have fled the city, some taking refuge in Montevideo and the towns up the river Parana, but by ifer, the larger portion are in the campo, within a distance of from ten to fifty miles from Buenos Ayres. Peasants and quuchos living in miserable mud-wa'led huts, with straw roofs have been besieged with importunate tenants from among the wealth and aristocracy of the Real public, and in scores of cases are receiving as much as \$250 to \$500 per month rent for their squalid abodes. Families who lived in suberb style two months ago are now cowering among the buts on the plains and sleeping on beds laid upon the floor of earth,—Cor. NY

Omineca and the Way to It,

It will have been seen from information published in these columns a few days ago that the greatest energy is being displayed in establishing easy communication between Quesnelmonth and Omineca, and that those operating upon that route claim very great advantages for tover any other. And there would appear to be no reason to question that, in so far at least as the products of the colony are concerned, the great bulk of the supplies will go in that ways. It is also certain that those resorting to the new Eldorado from the interior and from the neighboring American territory bordering thereon have for the most part adopted that route. But it is equally undeniable that a large proportion of those who made Victoria the starting point have preferred the coast or Skeena route. The various circumstances which have led to this result we care not to consider. It is with the fact alone that we have at present to do. ln an extract which we were per mitted to make from a private letter last week it was stated that a new route bad been discovered whereby parties could travel direct from the Forks of Skeena River to Tailah Lake, thereby saving very considerably in distance. To the survey and opening of this new trail it appears that Mr Dewdney has turned his attention. While avoiding all controversy respecting the rela tive merits of the two rival routes, we wish to orge upon the Executive the important daty of affording every reasonable facility for men and supplies getting in. So deeply convinced are we of the inctility of what is called a 'rush' to new and remote mining campa that we fondly hoped this sesson in so far as Omineca is concerned, and that the country would be found better prepared for a large accession to its mining population next year. From what is now known of that mining camp it is uscless to expect that excitement can be kept down-and there is every probability of a large number of peo-pte finding their way to Omineca. Under these circumstances the great duty of the hour is a strennous effort to increase the capacity to supply that distant market—and it is to the facilitating of this object that the utmost efforts of the Government should be put forth. We all know from bitter ex. \$438 perience the ill results of a rush even to grav the richest diggings without reasonable means of supply it the masses cannot get food or can only obtain it at famine prices the majority will turn away from the best pay dirt ever struck and curse the country.
