A dirigible balloon, equipped with a searchlight and, with twenty-six me aboard, flying through the air at the rate of fifty miles an hour, is the latest development in aerial navigation. The possibilities of such a means of transportation may be very great, all though it is absurd to suppose, as som do that an army can be moved by such means.
